#### Sándor Paull:

- So, Jesus that's what we do now. We look up we look towards you. We're so thankful that
- it's not about us, about our feelings, about our preferences, about our comfort. It's about
- you, your kingdom, your people, your reign on this Earth, your purpose for those that
- you've called.

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- I'm so thankful that we believe in a sovereign God that orders all things, is in all things,
- 8 through all things. We're so thankful that we're not under a law where it depends on our
- behavior. We're so thankful that we are not without faith that it's just a random chance.

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Let us be joyful people. Let us be a people at peace, at rest in our souls. Let us be a people that are free to love 1 another rightly. We give ourselves to you today. We give ourselves to you for what you'll do this week.

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Father, we pray that what you intend to do that it would come to all. That no one would feel marginalized or on the edge or seeing good things happen and others but not in them.
We pray that the light and the glory of your son Jesus would shine upon everyone here.

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- Jesus, do your work in us. As you know, every word and every thought, every motive behind those things
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we're shocked that somehow you still love us, you draw near. And so lead us today, be present. Thank you for what you're doing for each of us. Thank you for this family. In Jesus' name, amen.

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All right guys. Well, good morning. I can see some of you. There we go. It's good to be back here and it's wonderful to be together. For some of you, this is your first time with us for this Summer Conference and so we're glad that you're here.

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A couple just kind of basic things going on with a conference. Some of you get over people really, really quickly and so make sure that you can kind of sneak away and get some time to not sort of max out or use up all your bandwidth on the first day.

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Some of you need to sit in the edges or by the doors or those sorts of things, that's okay.
Normally, teachings here are about 3 hours and so if you have to get up and stretch and walk out of the back or something that's fine too.

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But we're going to kick things off today then. In a conference that is about God's sovereignty in all things, we're going to start off by talking about being together and

being one and being unified. And so we're going to get going in that today.

If you have a Bible, we're in Philippians chapter 2. I'll be in the first 4 verses as we're starting. Hey, some of you may not have heard that we have 3 churches in Texas now. Isn't that exciting?

#### Sándor Paull:

Yeah. And so if you hear some strange y'all's coming out of me, I've been working on that. And apparently, when you're talking to a bunch of people, it's all y 'all. And so if there are some things that you don't really understand me saying, that's where I've lived for the past 12 months.

We had a guy come by the office last week and I really didn't know what he meant. He was a younger guy and I figured out he wanted a ride someplace. But the place that he was wanting to go to, I knew it was north of where we

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were but I just couldn't...I said, "Tell me the name again." And he'd say it again real fast and real Southern.

And I said, "Okay. I'm putting it in my GPS. So spell it for me." And I think the word was like pilot or something. I have no idea. But I never figured out what he meant. I just knew, okay, we're going to go North and go in 21 and I think he won't kill me.

And so we're along the way. Wasn't quite sure of that. Anyway, if you hear some things out of some of us that sound a little funny, it's not your fault. It's our fault. All right.

So as we're starting then, we want to talk today about, and there's some work that we need to do together, to talk about this issue of unity and being together. What does the Bible have to say about that as a foundation for his sovereignty?

For what he's going to do in us about this week and together as a group of churches. And there are some things about this that have kind of all come together for me in the past 12 months in a way that is been pretty profound.

I was talking to 1 of the lead pastors that I coach and he was kind of trying to figure out some things in terms of what is he believed and what is this group of churches believes and does he agree with some of those things.

And what does that look like? And what happens if he doesn't agree or believe and trying to just wrestle through those kinds of things? Not things that are very dissimilar from you perhaps over the years of...

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Okay. So, here's something whatever the issue is, and what do I think about that? And does it line up with what I think or like or not line up with all of that? And we were talking through that and in the midst of talking it through, it was 1 of those bizarre moments like you've seen in the movies.

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Where I remember exactly where I was. I was driving in my truck, had that phone call on speakerphone, of course. I'm on 2818. You guys don't know what that is? It's Harvey Mitchell then you go, "Oh, Harvey Mitchell."

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I'm going south, heading home from work and I'm right by the George Bush Presidential Library there and as we're talking,

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all of a sudden, it was 1 of those in the movies where they're sort of the scene where all of the clips of the movie, they kind of Flash and all of a sudden this like, "Whoa, I get it" and it all sort of comes together at that moment. It was one of those moments of, "Oh, man."

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I get something that for 20 years, I've been trying to figure out. And the thing for 20 years I've been trying to figure out is related to unity and being together and it's related to me asking Steve, who leads this group of churches. So, okay on any particular issue, it's okay for a leader to determine its importance and what do you do about it?

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Because leaders, that's what it means to lead, right? That you influence and that you get what you want most times or you're not leading anything. And so, I regularly would say, so tell me the list of things that are as important as this thing that we brought up.

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Okay, I get that, that makes sense. I'm going to recalibrate. It seems like it's more important to you than it has been to me. So I'm going to move it up the list or put it on the different list of "maybe kind of important things but not a big deal", to the list of "you know, you probably need to really consider things." There's another list of "if you're going to be a member here, you probably need to" and then there's another list of "are you even a Christian?"

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And so, I'm trying to figure out so, okay, can I show you my list? And then, as I've worked through that, that question was always deflected. And I thought, "Come on, what's so hard about giving me the list?" I just need to know is it 1 list. Is it 4 lists?

And I thought, okay. I'm a logical guy. There's a reason why I can't seem to get the list out of my leader. It could be that he doesn't like the word list. So let's talk buckets.

Maybe the first bucket is, "since you've asked, I don't have a strong opinion but it could kind of be like this, some things to consider." The second bucket is "more important things of." The third bucket "if you're going to be a member here, you kind of need to.

Yeah, we can help you with that."

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The other bucket is "if you're evening really going to love Jesus, how do you not?" I thought, "Okay, that doesn't work."

Maybe it's one of those tests that you can't say it without blowing it. And so maybe I'm supposed to just sort of figure it out on my own and so I've worked for years on. I'll just figure out my list and maybe it's 1 of those secret test leader things that you don't really say that leaders are doing but it's happening.

And so, okay, I'll get that wink-wink. I can work on my own list and not just sort of have it handed and then that didn't seem to work and I thought, "Okay, Chris Miller, if you ever see a thing called secret list floating around the office. Don't tell Sean door." Maybe that's how I get the list. Maybe got a network kid and kind of work the angles a little bit.

I mean, I tried for so long to figure it out. So why be so coy about this? Is it that you don't have time to work on the list? Do we need to work on that together? Is it 1 one of those you don't want to say it in public because there are other leaders around? And so maybe just 1 on 1, I can get the list.

Because it feels like, in my head, how you approach leading is you have a person that you love and that you're trying to help and you're trying to get them their list to match your list on the different things of whatever, drinking or smoking or belief in the Bible on a particular issue or roles in the church or how marriages work or raising kids or drinking or pot or, and I mean, any of those things you have on a list somewhere of "yeah, probably not a good idea."

And there are some things that are much less good idea than other kinds of things. And so

somehow in the midst of this conversation on 2818, Harvey Mitchell right by the George Bush Museum, all of a sudden as I'm describing there is no list because this idea of unity means that all things that your leader has concerns about make them important.

And is not actually the thing itself as being the thing so that it's sort of intrinsic to the issue is its importance. It's anything that

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I love the person and I have concerns about becomes the thing.

And what if I've had the wrong paradigm the whole time? That you can't get there from here is what I like to say that. I've been asking for a list but there is no such thing. It's the wrong question to ask altogether.

It's kind of like the time I was praying with 1 of the leader's wives and she was saying, "I keep praying and asking Jesus and he won't answer. He's silent. Why won't he talk to me? Like, well, what's been going on? Well, I've been asking him to tell me why I'm such an awful person and terrible Christian, and he just won't say anything." I thought well, because it's a dumb...How is he supposed to answer that?

#### Sándor Paull:

throw me a bone.

You're not a terrible person and an awful Christian. Of course, he's going to be silent because you're asking unanswerable things. I didn't realize it. I just thought, come on,

I'm just trying to lead people in the same way and I have to know the list, the rules on this sort of a thing. And so there is no list. You'll never get one. And there are no buckets and you'll not get a list of those buckets either.

Because what we're going to talk about today is true biblical Doctrine. I really believe that. I really believe that what we're going to talk about today in this sort of oneness of mind and this being together in all things. I really, really do believe that there is such clear evidence in the Bible that it's just beyond doubt.

But I also believe that beyond doubt, it's more than just a Bible truth. That it's the heart of the father. And somehow if we can grasp both, that it is supposed to change our thinking and how we go out things, our belief, our Doctrine.

But if we can also say this is the heart of the Father, this is the longing of the Father for us individually and for us together, then it would give him joy for

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us to believe what he said on these things. And also to rejoice, to pursue, to eagerly desire, to make all efforts that his heart for us would really be fulfilled at these things.

Do you get the difference? It's both of those things. It is Bible Doctrine. And those of you that are wired more linearly and less emotionally, that makes sense. Okay, that's a language that we work with well.

And for many of you, the other part is helpful too though to know, it is the desire, the longing of Father for us that we would be together. Not just sort of affiliated with the same sort of identifier in some sense. But that we would be together.

And so here's a passage. Romans 15 says, "May the god of endurance and encouragement grant you to live in such harmony with one another in accord with Christ Jesus that together you may with one voice, glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ."

So it's the prayer of Paul then, right? And it's the heart of the Father expressed through his prayer in his longing to a church to say there'd be such crazy harmony and unity with each other that in the eyes of the world and in the hearing of the Father, as he hears our prayers and our longings and our intercession, we would be as 1 voice.

It would sound like it's not just sort of each of us saying something different or sounded that we would actually be together saying the same take. Acts 4 "now the full number of those who believed were of one heart and soul."

So, we see oneness of voice, oneness of the things that we're saying, and proclaiming, and believing, and saying and seeking but he also would say in the Bible that there is this oneness of soul, of spirit, of the inner man. the inner woman, 1 heart, 1 longing, unified and together in our desires and passions and affections.

Second Corinthians 13,

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"Comfort one another, agree with one another, live in peace, and the god of love and peace will be with you." Okay, wait. Let's unpack that for a second. Can you choose to agree if you don't agree? It's like saying you don't like pizza, can you just decide to like pizza and it makes it so because you just pick that?

You know, those of you who don't like cooked mushrooms because the texture which to me is crazy. I mean, that's the good part of the pizza. Can you just choose to not think they're slimy and gross and it just happens to change what you...We think of it like that, right? It's just our inherent thing that you just can't change. It's just what I am.

Could it be that we agree with 1 another? That we really do agree. That we really do believe the same things. First Corinthians 1, "I appeal to you brothers by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ that all of you agree that there be no divisions among you but that you may be united in the same mind and the same judgment."

So, we've seen a oneness of heart, a oneness of soul, oneness of voice. And now, we're seeing the same mind and same judgment. That we really do think the same thing about the same things.

That you really would say, okay, if you talk to somebody that is a part of this family of churches and then you talk to somebody else that's across the country and eventually overseas, that's going to be pretty neat, guys.

Do you know how long we prayed to have a church plant overseas? Unbelievable. We're living in good days. We are. We're living in good days. Some of you in your career, you're that's had its side of heydays, it's peak, with the predecessors and other people and it's sort of in decline. I mean, there are things with churches and individual people, they're kind of at their peak and in the end in decline.

This really is a wonderful time to be a part of this family where there are great things happening and greater things yet coming. That we would be united in the same mind, the same judgment that we really would think the same things.

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There are going to be people that get to know this family called to be a part of us that is in Taiwan that will then meet people there and fall in love with that family. And then we'll get to know them and they'll think, oh, you're just like...It's going to be like that.

First Peter 3, "Finally, all of you have unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, a tender heart, and a humble mind." We're going to see in our verses today that somehow the antidote to this sort of individualism and this I have to be right and some of those things that cause divisions and strife and conflict, that the antidote to that sickness and it is something that in, especially American culture, we're sick with. I mean, it is a disease.

Independence, individualism, I have to be right. I mean, it is a disease in public discourse and politics, all kinds of areas local and national we see that just constantly this issue. But if somehow it together with us that the areas of responsibility that he's entrusted to us if we would say, "No, I'm going to have a humble mind."

Our verses in Philippians, I've always taken these first 11 verses in Philippians chapter 2:1-11. I've always taken this text to saying there are a few helpful things but then the main part is about this humility of Christ and him being found in human form, obedient to death on a cross and every knee will bow. And that's 1 of those passages that always gives you chills, isn't it? You're like, "Oh, man."

Okay. Let me read it again and see if it does it again. Then you read it again and it does it again. Then you read it next week and it does it again. You have passages like that, right? It just doesn't wear off. You don't get used to how amazing it is. It does something to your soul.

To me, the blessing passage in Genesis does the same thing where Israel is on his deathbed and he's 140 years old and he rallies his strength to sit up in bed. And he has his 2 grandkids placed on his knee. Joseph brings Ephraim and Manasseh and he crossed his hands

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and gives a greater blessing to the younger and he says, no father, no. He grabs his hand to move him to the older son.

And he says, no, father. He grabs his hand to move him to the older son and he says, I know my son. I know. He's going to become a great nation as well but he is being led by God and those things. I read that grandfather's blessing and it just makes me weep every time. It just doesn't wear off.

I've always taken these verses as the meat of this. The point of this is obviously this incredible truth about Jesus. And yet somehow, I think that all of the 5 through 11 verses are undergirding this greatest idea of verses 1 through 5. And this idea is to be together.

And the incredible hair-raising example of Jesus and his humility, which we'll talk about, is to then support and leverage this idea. It's to tip this. It's to lift a weight that Paul is trying to say of. It's so important that we love each other. It's so important that we're together. It's so important that we're 1.

And so let's see if it does that for you as well. I think it will. Philippians chapter 2. Let me just start then with the first 4 verses. "So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any

comfort from love, any participation in the Spirit and the affection and sympathy, complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. That you should be looking out not only to his own interests but also to the interests of others." Let's stop there. And we'll pray.

Father, we need your help, your grace, your favor, your forgiveness, your courage in these things. That you would heal us where we need to be healed. That you would grant us the great gift

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of repentance when we need to turn. I know that among us there could even be the roots of bitterness that are growing because of things that we've done and said to each other.

And I pray that the foundation that you'll build upon the rest of this week, that it would be firm, that it would be secure, that it would be sharp and pure and perfect and able to be built upon to carry the load of what you'll do with us together.

We pray that you would prepare us for such things. That your Holy Spirit would rest upon us and bless us in our thinking, in our emotional response, in our understanding of our past, of our own role and responsibility in these churches.

As we think about each other as we all follow imperfect leaders and we all lead and influence in perfectly ourselves. So, I pray that grace would abound today. Towards us and from us and through us. Let grace abound, let Jesus be exalted. We pray in his name. Amen.

Back at verse 1. If there's any encouragement in Christ. There are 5 things that he begins in this great plea for unity. Five things that he mentions. The first is if there's any encouragement in Christ. If there's anything in Jesus, what is the heart of him and all of this?

If there's anything that seeing his life, hearing his words, knowing what he wanted, if there's anything, by the way, out of all of the 5 things, even just 1 of the 5 is enough for us to go, "I get it. I believe it. It's true. It's what he wants."

Jesus did say by this all people will know that you are my disciples. Remember what he says? By this 1 thing. He could have said lots of things. By this 1 thing. This is the identifier to a condemned world, to a dark and dying world that you belong to me. What's the identifier?

By the love that you have for each other. By this, all men will know that

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you're my disciples when they come in and they see this amazing family of God. These people of all different races of all different ages of all different backgrounds, really loving each other.

I remember years ago, a gal came into vine on a Sunday and she said, you know, I saw everybody talking they're so happy and smiling and then I realize, oh, it's real. They really love each other like this. They're not just sort of faking it.

Then it was this sobering reality of, oh, my, this is actually a real thing. This isn't just a put-on-time in your service, turn to say hi to your neighbor, oh, hi, very good to meet you. I say next, oh, so good to see you little old lady that I don't really want...

# Sándor Paull:

That we really do have a love for 1 another. What's the heart of Jesus? If there's any encouragement in Christ, what's the next thing? The second?. If there's any comfort from love, if there's any comfort from this love, what if we were on our own? What if we were doing this by ourselves? What if we were still orphans?

What if we weren't sought out by the father to belong to him? What if we were trying to figure this out on our own? What if he left us to ourselves? What if he hadn't saved us and we ended up living our lives the way the most broken in our families live their lives. Think about the most unhealthy broken in your families. You don't have to think too far.

Are we different than them? Are we better than them? If there's any comfort from this love, if there's any comfort from being loved and saved and changed it, is he say next if there's any participation with the Holy Spirit. What does the Holy Spirit want? What's he lead us towards?

And so it's interesting to think about what I'm trying to establish then is this idea of being together, this shocking, unity that really is shown within the Trinity. It really is shown in the example of Jesus relating to the father, relating to God, the spirit. It really is shown there.

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Keep your spot in Philippians. Turn to John 17. So keep your finger in that spot. If you're 393 saying I'm swiping, I can't...Keep that spot anyway, somehow and turn to John 17 and 394 let's look at verse 20. You're flipping a lot. You should be there by now. Okay. I'm just 395 teasing. 396 397 [laughter] 398 399 Sándor Paull: 400 Now. You're turning real quietly. So don't know here. 401 402 [laughter] 403 404 Sándor Paull: 405 All right. Jesus prayer. I do not ask for these only the existing living disciples at that time. 406 But also for those who will believe in me through their word. Okay, that's us right? We've 407 believed in Jesus through the words of the Apostles, through scripture, through the Bible. 408 Okay. 409 410 So what's Jesus asking for? What does he want? What's his prayer? Verse 21, "They may 411 all be one." [inaudible] just you father. [inaudible] Still with you? Hearing that? Okay. 412 [inaudible] and I'm in you. You may have to get the other mic. Where are we again? 413 [laughter] 415 416 Sándor Paull: 417 We're in Carbondale Vine Church. Okay. Got it. Now, Verse 21. "They may all be in 418 me." Okay. So Jesus wants us to be 1 just as how? So this unity, he's saying the unity that 419 we all have together is just like you father are in me and I in you. Is there a gap of unity? 420 Thanks, Casey. I'm glad I'm not hosting this anymore. That's so nice. All kinds of 421 problems. None of those are my problems. 422 423 [laughter] 424 425 Sándor Paull: 426 They're all your problems now. God bless you, Casey Raymer. All right. Where are we 427 again? Verse 21. Okay. Jesus wants us to be 1. How? What kind of oneness? Just as you 428 Father are in me and I in you. 429

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430 So, is there a gap? Is there a difference? What kind of unity is there and oneness 431 [(0:26:00)]432 between God Father and God the Son? You'd say well, perfect in every single way. That 433 they also may be in us so that the world may believe that you've sent me. Wonderful. So 434 we see it in the Trinity. 435 436 Those of us that are married, we see it in God's longing and desire for us in marriage. 437 That we would have this unity and oneness between a very different male and female, 438 right? A husband and a wife and somehow working that out in the wonderful, sovereign, 439 complementary, giftings, their personality and ability and the makeup of God. 440 441 It's wonderful that we see that. This hope for him is that you'd see this participation in the 442 Spirit. This example of what the Holy Spirit's doing in our marriages and what the Holy 443 Spirit's doing through the Trinity. And an example of that is the same kind of unity that 444 we're supposed to have. It's shocking to think. 445 446 Remember the disciples saying Jesus, just show us the Father and that's enough for us. 447 What do you mean show you the list? There's no list. What do you mean show you the 448 father? It's the same idea, right? Don't you understand that if you've seen me, you've seen 449 the father? I and the Father are one. You're looking at him. Yeah. 451 I mean Hebrew says all Of the fullness of the father is in Jesus in bodily form. 452 Everything. It's that kind of unity. Any affection and sympathy, do we have any affection 453 for each other? 454 455 By the way, it's used 11 times in the New Testament. This word affection and it means 456 literally the inward parts, the bowels, meaning the kind of deep inside of us. We live in a 457 culture that says affection like I love Cheetos or something and people use that word all 458 the time and they mostly use it to mean affections. 459 460 Like I like things. Oh, I like you. I feel friendly things towards you. And so when we hear 461 the word love, it's been so overused, misused, underused, all of that, that we just sort of 462 attributed to sort of affections of I love cheeseburgers more than I love hamburgers kind 463 of a thing. 464 [(0:28:00)]465

But the word used really is about the inward part of who we are. That there's something in the depth of us that would grow with this affection for each other where we so love to

see 1 another and to be with 1 another. We don't want it to end. Time sort of flies by and some of you know that's like to have a friend like that. I think it's a Godly wonderful thing.

There's a couple of guys over the years where I just feel like, Oh, man." We just never run out of things to say. There are never those awkward silences and I feel like a teenage girl that says, "No, you hang up first. No, you hang up first."

#### Sándor Paull:

There's a couple of guys like that. Not very many on this Earth but a few of them where it feels like, "Oh, man." It's not worth to be around them. And I don't feel like a pastor ever. I just feel like we're just friends. And it works that way.

That's what he's saying this affection and then he says this sympathy. If there's any sympathy, the fifth thing in the first verse, what's the effect on others? How is this going to thinking about other people's response and their faith and their life?

And then what does he say? Verse 2, "Complete my joy." Now, that's no small thing for a leader to say. Complete my joy. If this would just happen then I wouldn't ask or need anything else to ever happen in my life. My joy would be complete. Okay?

I remember praying that as a brand new Christian. If my mom and dad would just know Jesus, I would never ask you for another thing. Everything else would be gravy. Life would be good. I wouldn't eat anything else. That's isn't that level of a thing. Complete my joy. That's a huge thing for a leader to say.

Hebrew 17, familiar to many of you. It says, "Obey your leaders and submit to them for they keeping watch over your souls." Picture sort of a high thick wall that's sort of a garden wall and there's a watchtower and they're peeking through the thing looking for ambush, guarding and watching and being careful that there's no siege laid to the city,

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that the walls don't fall down. They're keeping watch. They're being careful there. They're pacing and being alert, that kind of an idea.

That those they have to give an account. Let them do this with joy and not groaning for that would be of no advantage to you. Complete my joy. And guys, it is a great joy to lead most, no, now all of you.

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### Sándor Paull:

One of my favorite things that we do regularly at Christ's Land Church is what I call the 3rd Friday. And it's always funny when I have a group leader asked "So, when's the group leader thing?" "You mean, the 3rd Friday? Well, let's look at a calendar."

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#### Sándor Paull:

Third Friday means it would be on this date. I thought by the nature of the title, it would absolve those kinds of conversations completely but apparently, that's not how we roll.

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#### Sándor Paull:

And so the 3rd Friday comes and I love it. In our home, we get the group leaders together and there are some things to talk about. We worship together. We eat and have fun. Open the Bible together. Pray for 1 another. God shows.

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It's become my absolute favorite thing that we do. And 1 of my favorite things is just before we get started, to just listen to how loud it gets in my house as we're together and we're eating and having fun and loving each other, I just love it.

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Because I love the people. And being with them and seeing how they're doing and some are doing great and it's awesome. And they love Texas way better than knowing that others. It's hard. And it's a different life. And they're getting hit and they're pushed. And their job, if they have 1, is not very easy and things are tough. I love the 3rd Friday. It's the favorite thing that we do.

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And so I've decided I don't want to ever outgrow my house. So we're not going to have any new leaders. We're just going to keep the same.

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## Sándor Paull:

I'm teasing. All right. Look at verse 2. Complete my joy

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by being what? By being friendly. By not fighting. Is that what it says? Complete my joy by not fighting. Complete my joy by not running anybody off by just sticking it out long-term. Is that what it says? Complete my joy by being of the same mind.

I don't know if this analogy will help or not. But if you have ever seen pictures of the Doomsday Clock kind of an idea. So it's like a big digital thing that's got a running timer and when it gets down to zero, bad things happen and people hit nuke buttons or something. I don't know what happens. We haven't hugged trees enough or saved enough whales and things melt or bad things happen. It's that kind of an idea. And so what's the point?

My point is that I think that for many of us, I don't mean all but I do think for many and I know that it's been true for me, my clock was running at 1 time because of things that I didn't know how to resolve that was growing in my heart that would have been terminal if not resolved. Okay?

Things that I felt frustrated about. Things that I felt mistreated or misunderstood or not heard or hurt or offended or whatever. Some things that I was trapped in that I could not extricate myself from. There have been times over 20 years when my clock was running and unless there was something to intervene or intersect, it was going to get 20 and I was going to blow up. I mean that.

And I don't think it's true for every single 1 of you but I do know that it's true for many of you. That there have been times when there were some things that you needed to deal with and work out and repent and forgive and humble yourself, and God gave Grace and for many of you, you've walked in that grace and thank Jesus that he gives amazing grace and you get the credit for walking in that grace. Does that make sense?

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It's kind of like saying, hey, parents of well-behaved kids or healthy teenagers, that's not accidental in a broken World. You've done a good job. Well, it's wasn't us. It was Jesus. Yeah, I know, but it was his grace that you chose to use over and over again when they're toddlers and that's ha-ha-ha-hard living.

I mean, if you had toddlers in a vehicle or a baby in a car for more than 1 hour, it's ha-ha-hard living. Some of you, your clock is going right now and you're okay. It's not a zero yet. You've sort of kicked the can down the street for a little bit. You've not had to deal with it. Ignored and chosen to get past and think about other things.

 But there may be some underlying things that have never really been resolved. Some things that you've never really forgiven. Some things that you've never really had the emotional courage to say and to admit. And to have to really deal with. There are some of you from prior tripped experience.

There are some things that leave you unable to really trust and open up. That you let people so far but they're certain areas of if they go there I'm going to just ignore it and say no. I'm going to deflect. This is available to them but this part, nobody touches that part.

There are some of you that your clock is running. And that there are things that Jesus wants to give you a moment of grace to be able to deal with, to be able to resolve. And praying for this morning, I had hoped that many of you would say, I'm going to come and just confess and repent and have a clear conscience for the rest of what Jesus wants to do this week. I'm going to seek someone out and tell them that I forgive them or ask them to forgive me.

And if it means that we have an uncomfortable conversation, so be it. But I'm going to make every effort to leave my gift at the altar, go and be reconciled,

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then come back and offer the gift. Jesus seems to put high importance on such things.

Paul says, in verse 2, complete my joy by being of what does he say next? Same mind, same love, full accord, 1 mind. Look at it again, verse 2. Complete my joy. For Paul to say as a leader, if you do this, I won't ask for another thing. I'll be completely happy and satisfied. Complete my joy. Same mind, Same Love, full accord, 1 mind.

It must mean some kind of crazy unity of being together. And somehow and now that we actually live 2 hours south of Waco in Texas, people start to get a little edgy about that and go, "How do I know that that's safe? Doesn't that feel a little weird?" "No. It's the definition of safe. That's the definition of safe."

Those of you that are wives trusting your husbands, is that a dangerous thing to do? Well, if you've married a punk of a man, perhaps. But it's not supposed to be that way. When we submit surrender and Trust Our Lives to Jesus, it wasn't that we somehow lost our independence and lost our way to sort of ruler own destiny. We found true freedom in submission, didn't we? We found it. He rescued us from ourselves.

Years ago, we were a part of a network of churches and in the vineyard, there was some sort of paradigms to help understand unity. And the paradigms were these sort of made-up words that, and we make up our own words to at times. But the words were there is a

bounded set theory of unity.

There is a centered set and a fuzzy set. And the fuzzy set is just there were graphs of little arrows going every which direction. A fuzzy set is sort of a way of thinking about how we relate. That everybody's kind of thinks whatever they want. And there's no cohesion. It doesn't matter and we just all love each other. Everything's fine.

The other way of thinking is there's a centered set. The centered set is

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here are the central most important things. Lots of peripheral things that make no difference and so on the big things, but let's agree. And on everything else, who cares?

And then there is a bounded set which is there are defined lines of what's in, what's out. What's on the list. What's not. What's in the bucket? What's out of the bucket? What's on the red list? What's on the yellow list? What's on the orange list? That kind of an idea. And so I come out unity and leading thinking about lists and buckets in colors.

And the reality is what all came rushing in that day on 2818 Harvey Mitchell next to the George Bush Library was anything that we are not together in becomes an issue. But the practical side of me, says, "Really? On all things big and small, can we really love 1 another? How does that practically work? How does that work? Is that really the thing that is the thing?

Well, I think from the Bible that it is. And I think from the heart of the Father that it is. But then it creates some issues of really, how do we do that in a small group? How do you do that with a husband and a wife? How do you do that with teenagers? How is that even possible? On all things? Because I like some things and believe in some things that y' all don't like. See, there's the y'all?

You don't like medium rare steaks, it's time you go. Are you kidding? I like cows and so maybe you go "Are you kidding?" So is that what we're talking about? That we all sort of have the same playlist and you all start having to like reggae because [inaudible] is the best music genre out there.

I mean, doesn't it seem absurd when you sort of mock it 682 in that kind of a way. But if the Bible really says it then it has to be true and it does say it. 683 These verses really say it. 684 685 And so how do you get there? What does it mean? Well, it means that you work together. 686 You make every effort to guard the unity of the faith through the bond of peace. We have 687 to work on those things. 688 689 Husbands wives, Do you have to work on stuff? Do you have to have long conversations? 690 Do you wish you could snuggle your wife and just go to bed and said she wants to talk 691 about feelings and things? That's how it goes, isn't it? You bet. I'm like, I don't want to 692 sleep or snuggle and the last thing I want to do is talk. 693 694 [laughter] 695 696 Sándor Paull: 697 That's the last thing that I want to do but we'll talk. We'll work it out. 698 699 [laughter] 700

Pastor: I thank Jesus, I have a very low-maintenance wife. I've told her many times. Would you pray and impart your sexy stability to these other young wives? Because husbands need that. I'm digressing in dangerous territory.

#### Sándor Paull:

We work on it guys. We ask Jesus to change us. We say, wait if a person that I love and trust is concerned, how can I not be concerned about that? The technical rightness or wrongness on any issue, I mean, think of it this way wives. If you trust and love and follow your husband in a way that's pleasing to the Father and he's wrong, what happens then? You're honored by God. And he's got to deal with that.

See, we often think about technical rightness. And there are times that your leaders are just wrong and you're right. It's true. It's going to happen. It shouldn't happen most of the time. You should be leading that person instead of them leading you. But it's going to happen sometimes.

I think that being 1 is greater than a particular rightness on any 1 individual thing. I think that. I think that somehow we would say, I'm going to choose to trust

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and somehow say away Jesus has put my leader in this place and if they're wrong, he'll speak to my leader on that.

And my leader has the ability to hear Jesus. That's been proven over time and they have enough humility that Jesus speaks, they'll turn and they'll change and they'll come to a different conclusion. And if they don't and we go forward, I'm still blessed by God in all of this.

Now. Does that sound like crazy? It's a little self-serving, right? Because as a leader myself, it's like, well, I want everybody to do that so that they just do what I say and think what I think.

It seems to be a little self-serving but somehow we have to get past that to say, but wait, if it really is in the Bible and God's will for us, if it really is his heart, if it really is how he intends marriages to work and it is true in the Trinity that there's just a oneness, if there's something that because of the water we swim in, it's so hard because there's conflict and individualism.

What really burns my toast nowadays is that everything I do, I get an email survey of how was your Chick-fil-A Burger? How could we have served you better? And I think you can't, Chick-fil-A is awesome.

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#### Sándor Paull:

You guys, this is a fantastic job in the Chick-fil-A sauce. There's some magic in that. I don't know what they put in there but I could just eat that. I think. Wait. Why do you care about my opinion of what my experience was like on the customer helpline, with my home warranty company I mean, how does that matter? My opinion doesn't matter. It shouldn't matter about those kinds of things. Why are you asking me?

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So we're trained in our culture, especially in the last 10 years. That you leave a review. You have any experience, people have to know about every single thing that you think about everything that's ever happened to you. That you leave some commentary and your opinion. People are trained now. We are trained and conditioned that I have to give my opinion. My voice has to be heard.

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And the truth is on many things, your voice and your opinion don't matter. If Jesus hasn't put you in that role of responsibility

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in coming back into Southern, Illinois. I don't know if you realize it but SIU is in a hard spot. It's been kind of a mess. And that's painful because we love SIU and those of us that have graduated, our degrees are worth even less than it was when we got those degrees.

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But Jesus has entrusted to me a new responsibility at SIU. Is that make sense? I'm not held due and accounted for anything that happens there. My sphere of influence is not SIU in any remote way.

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And so my opinion of the president, the chancellor, my opinion of the board's voting of this or that and no confident, my opinion of it SIUE, SIUC, consolidating campus, I mean, those kinds of things that are going on at SIU, my opinion makes no difference. Because it's irrelevant. It's unimportant.

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I think we think too highly of ourselves and that gets to the actual problem. See the thing that makes us feel like how as this soon-to-be 20 churches turns into 40, and 60, and whatever Jesus does in the future, how can it really happen? How can even 1 church

really have this together?

Well, Paul helps us with all of that. Look at the next verse. Do nothing from 2 things. He begins then sort of kind of talk through then the sickness and then he gives the prescription. What's the sickness? What's the reason that it seems so impossible for us to imagine, conceive this. Do nothing from 2 things, selfish ambition or conceit?

So, there it is. It's hard to imagine, isn't it? That the problem is probably us in these things. Now, I came to that conclusion in a bit of a salty way years ago. Most things that I struggle with end up being my fault 1 way or another. Most things that go wrong

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in the church are my fault 1 way or another. And it stinks and I can have self-pity but it just happens to be true most times.

Seventeenth-century French Theologian John Calvin on these verses says this. There are 2 most dangerous pests for disturbing the peace of the church. Strife is awakened when everyone is prepared to maintain perniciously his own opinion. And when it is begun to rage, it rushes headlong in the direction from which it has entered.

Vainglory tickles, men's minds so that everyone is delighted with his own inventions, his own opinions. Hence, the only way of guarding against dissensions is when we avoid strifes by deliberating and acting peacefully especially if we are not actuated by ambition, for ambition is a means of fanning all strifes.

And so think about who has left the church or left badly. It's 1 of the things that I feel like, am I going to be able to do this long-term because I love people that aren't with us any longer. That's been so...I've had staff members, pastors. I had 4 staff members leave in 1 semester and I remember calling Steven saying Steve, is it me?

Because sometimes it is, right? Sometimes that's the scary, awful thing about leading people. Sometimes, yeah, it is you. You are the fault. You are the issue. And when he said, I don't think so. I think they've got their things. I chose to trust him because I believe that if it was me, he loves me enough that he'd tell me.

And you should demand of your leader that they love you enough to tell you what they really think. And they've got to gauge than are you mature enough to handle and is it the time that the Holy Spirit set out for the different things? Of course, all of that. But we're compelled by love to speak the truth.

I mean, if I'm often some sketchy thinking or behavior and my leader sees it and is just praying but not saying when it's the time to say it, that's a problem, isn't it? We're compelled by love to protect and defend and to say and then to forgive and not to have to say it perfectly in just the right way. We're compelled by love if your leader really believes something and you're unwilling to hear them on it, that's a problem. That's a problem.

See, some of you have leaders on different ends of the spectrum. Some that are easier to follow because their opinions either line up more closely with yours or they don't hold those things strongly enough that they kind of say, well whatever you want. Let me just say my piece. And there are some things that are helpful about that and some things that are dangerous.

And then other leaders are really strong in their convictions and in their beliefs and to maintain unity with a leader like that means that you've got to really wrestle through because if they have a problem and they're concerned and they're not at peace with something and they have an issue, then it's something that you can't go forward in or do an end-run around them.

You ever done that where you ask your leader, hey, what do you think? And then when they say it you're like, oh, man. Now, how do I go forward? Now that the [inaudible] what they think and they told me what they think. How do I then go do that? Because they've said, you have 3 puppies, the fourth 1 is crazy and I really want that fourth puppy I mean, whatever the thing is, you put yourself in a hard spot.

But if you are led by the same person for very long and you get to a place or thing, I think, I know what they would say about the fourth puppy. We can't have people over because my house is covered with dog hair already and it just stinks like a kennel. I think I know what they'd say, so I'm not going to ask. I'll ask somebody else. Because I think I know that they might say something that gives me the outcome that I want.

See, we're not above such things, are we? I remember it wasn't too far from here that I was

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riding my Yamaha R1 with a group of guys and we were hitting some back roads which are fun to do. And we're on 127 coming back in the Murfreesboro and a cop's come in the other direction and he hits his lights and I think, okay, he got me. I look down. I'm doing 95 which when you're doing 140 plus 95 feels like nothing.

And so I remember thinking I'm not going very fast. They'll just say boys are boys but I

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858	look down doing 95 and I calculate in my mind, he's going to just say nothing. And so in
859 860	a couple of moments, I downshift and they say in Southern Illinois, I shower down on it which means floor it. And so I'm running from the cops now as a pastor of a church

888	And so the other pastor was Ben. So, I told Ben, "Ben, would you pray for me?"

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"I just ran from the cops at 189 miles an hour and I know I have to confess and deal with it but I don't want to really deal with it because I know what really dealing with it would mean.

[(0.52.00)]896 We kind of work things to our own end, don't we? We kind of know who...You ask the 897 dog lover about this fourth puppy, you don't ask the cat lover because they're going to 898 say, are you nuts? 899 900 Let's not overestimate our ability to kind of get our own means, to get our own ends, to 901 sort of work a problem to get what we want. What if in these verses it's not about what 902 we want. 903 Do you see that in these verses somewhere? Some great priority for individualism. Our independence. Us getting what we want. Is that in these verses? Is this in the heart of Paul? The longing of Father for us that we all get what we want? 907 908 Is that in here somewhere and I've just missed it? What about the rest of the gospels of 909 the Bible? Is that somehow in there? And I'm just sort of overlooking that and sort of 910 prioritizing something? 911 912 Am I misunderstanding things? See who left the church and left badly? Were they sick 913 with this selfish ambition? Were they metastasized? Was it cancer growing with conceit 914 with these sort of issues? 915 916 See, I've heard this many times. A person that I'm leading saying I hear you and so pray 917 for me. And what it means is, I'm going to seek Jesus, pray that he tells me what I'm 918 supposed to do whether you're right or not. Pray for me. I hear you and I'm gonna go 919 consider and see God and consider what you've said. 920 921 I'm going to add that into the mix of the things and I'll let you know. I'll get back to you 922 and let you know whether or not it's going to make sense, I'm going to do it or not. It's 923 kind of what they mean. And so I'll consider but I want to hear you. I want to hear what 924 you think and I'll get back to you on that. I'll consider it. I'll let you know. 925 926 If you have said that, or have felt that, or that's been said to you, verse 3 is at play. Do 927 nothing from selfish ambition or conceit. That's really what it is. We're all in danger of 928 thinking too highly of our own opinions. All of us. We're all in danger of that 929 [(0.54.00)]930 because our opinions are right in our own mind or you wouldn't think that. Agreed? 931 932

You wouldn't think that. Is it smart for the Spurs to trade Leonard? Some of you say

yeah, some of you say no. You think that because that's your opinion and you wouldn't

think it if you didn't think it was the right thing. We're all in danger of that.

My second favorite author C.S. Lewis, I've got your interest, don't I? Johnny Bill James[?] is number 1 for me right now. C.S. Lewis is a close second. He writes this in Perelandra, the middle book of the space trilogy where he writes and this is, by the way, the Eve character talking to the Ransom character regarding a rule from the god figure in the books about where they're living and these floating land versus fixed lands.

You'd have to read it. I'm not going to explain it. If you haven't read it yet. It's your fault. He says I think he made 1 law of that kind. Meaning doesn't go to the fixed lands. They're in the floating lands. In order that there might be obedience and all these other matters, what you call obeying Him is but doing what seems good in your own eyes also. Is love content with that?

Meaning. I'll do them if I also agree. See, there's no benefit in us only doing it when we also agree. That's actually not being led. That's just we happen to have the good coincidence of sort of feeling similarly and so we act similarly. The real test of "are we leadable or not" is when we don't like it when we don't agree. That's the real test.

And any pastor and lead pastor worth their salt is going to before releasing anybody as a leader, they're to find something to press them on that the person doesn't agree with to find out what are they going to get.

They're going to find something to correct on because all of us are pretty happy when we're getting our own way.

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Most kids eating an ice cream sundae are not grouchy kids. But the real question becomes what happens when we don't get our way?

And I've seen some highs become apart that you would not imagine that a person had the capacity to do when they didn't get their way. Some of the most well put together, mature. I thought I want to be like them and they on a minor thing, they just come sideways.

She going on as love content with that. You do them indeed because they are his will. But not only because they are his will. Where can you taste the joy of obeying unless he bids you to do something for which his bidding is the only reason?

See, here's the thing guys. There is a joy that you miss out on when you only follow when you agree. There is a joy in saying I trust the father. There is a joy in saying I'm going to

consider other people's opinions more important than my own and I'm blessed. Even they're wrong, God is going to honor me for this and the greater importance of my own rightness on an issue is this family.

And the sympathy that we have because if I blow my life and my marriage up and I'm gone, I know what that does to the hearts of everybody else in this family that we love because it's happened to me. All of you have people that you love that aren't in your local church any longer. Agreed?

Vine people. Are there any people that you love and did life with wanting to look like them and be like them and they're not at Vine any longer? Some of them don't even act like Christians any longer. They're doing something else somewhere else.

Now don't misunderstand me. I'm not saying if you leave this, you're not in God's will and you can't be a Christian if you're not in this group. Don't understand me to say that. Please don't go there.

But all of us grieve over people that know they were supposed to be in this family. And I know that everybody that left that was called here, it could have been worked out if they were able to let it get worked out. In every single time.

I've been at this, for 20 years and there's not been 1 time where I thought, oh, man. Every single time, if they would have been willing to deal with it,

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we could have gotten this resolved. It could have worked out. It should have worked out. It had to have been workoutable because we're a family.

We're called to the same body and it has to be that there isn't some context of conversation and situation that makes things untenable. The clock was ticking and you just couldn't stop it. Runaway train. I don't believe that at all.

See sometimes, obeying precedes the agreeing. That's true a lot of times. A lot of times I've said I don't technically agree but oh, man if you think that's an important thing, I'm in. I'll do it. And there were times that after that, pretty quick after that, I thought, oh my goodness. I couldn't see that. I was blinded by my own opinions and perception.

All of us have massive blind spots. Wives, your husbands have blind spots. Sure they do. All of us have blind spots. And it's the fool of a person that doesn't allow God's great sovereignty in having people that he's put around us to protect us from ourselves. It's the fool of a person.

You can read the Bible. David had people around him. They gave him right and good counsel and warnings that time. We all need that. See, the antidote to this, again, verse 3. Complete my joy.

And guys, I had a survey 1 time. How many hours per week do you spend on conflict resolution? It's a multiple-choice? Answer A was like 3 to 5 hours a week. I was shocked that the lowest answer was like 5 hours a week on resolving internal conflicts and messes within the church. I thought, really?

Oh man, I spend 5 hours a semester, 5 hours a year on Conbliss[?] it's just not very common. Some of you have come from churches where on the outside it's all hippieskippy we love each other huggy but on the inside, it's a mess. And deacons are cussing out the pastor and they're doing votes. And some of you have been in those places.

I've got friends outside of this group of churches that have been in those kinds of

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town hall meetings where this it's just vitriol. It's ugly. That we really do love each other.
Complete my joy. Same mind. Same Love. Full accord. One mind. Don't be selfish. Don't be conceited. But what's the antidote to this sickness?

That our culture is just ate up with. It's true. We're just ate up with it. You can't talk to anybody that's in local or national government. It's a mess of a deal. In humility, consider others more significant. So the issue is humility and then tied to humility, verse 4.

Don't think about what your own interest is because we all get tunnel vision on our right and us, but think about what's happening to everybody else. There's a greater thing. You might win the battle, but lose the war, right? You might technically be right but you've just simply blown up a whole bunch of other things.

And then verse 5 have this mind among yourselves. So he's saying, humility is the deal, guys. Preferring and thinking about each other is the deal. Don't be selfish, don't be conceited, humility is the deal.

And here's the example that Paul gives. Let's look at it together, verse 5. Have this in mind the point of the next verses. This kind of unity and oneness is so incredible the way to do it is to have this mind which is yours in Christ Jesus who though he was in the form of God did not count equality with God. Something to be grasped emptied himself, taking the form of a servant being born in the likeness of man being found in human form. Pause there.

So the first thing is this infinite condescension of the Christ that he is doesn't have to grasp equality with God. He is in the form of God. He is God. And so God takes on a human body. Crazy humility. Always existed, all things made through the sun. All things held together. Even at Hebrews 1. It's 1 of my favorite places.

This kind of humility that God would take on a human

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body and become one of us, the likeness of men found in human form shocking. Close the book, move on, we all pray and cry and feel good and go home.

There's more, what's next. Humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Then the exaltation comes later than in the next verses. So the 2 things that Paul says are this awesome incredible, shocking, humility of Christ that he would come into this Earth as a human and that he would allow himself to be crucified and murdered by the very people that he made, incredible. If you have this heart, if you have this, we will not fail.

Guys, it is the heart of the Father that we would be one. And how amazing will it be when there are more people that English is not their first language. How amazing will it be that most people? This idea of Christianity is not their default. I think the statistics in College Station where we're living now is that they're 55% of people identify as Christian.

I have not met very many that I think really loved him. Very few out of that 55% actually really loved him and their life looks anything like a biblical disciple. But they believe in the Bible. They would say their affiliate was Jesus. What's it going to look like when there are more people that are not like us?

What's it going to look like when there are more people that think differently than us. See, there are already some things that pull at the fabric in the unity of our church when it comes to politics. Is Trump Satan. Or is Hillary Satan? Or both of them Satan's?

I mean, it doesn't take much, doesn't take much. Whispering and gossip and bitterness. It doesn't take much of passive-aggressive. And if there's anybody that knows passive-

120000 people, right?

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aggressive, I know passive. I'm better at being passive-aggressive than y 'all are at being 1093 passive-aggressive. 1094 [(0:64:00)]1095 Doesn't take much of that. Doesn't take much relational tension. 1096 1097 In a bigger church, you can kind of kick the can on the street but in a smaller church 1098 especially, age just doesn't fly. It just doesn't work. You just can't avoid it. You can't 1099 evade it. There's a hundred of you. You got to see him. You got to sit by him. You got to 1100 do life together. You got to work it out somehow. It is what God wants for us. 1101 1102 It is clear in the Bible that we are going to be together. And so what is that mean? What 1103 do we do? We asked him for help. We humble ourselves at every opportunity. We are 1104 open-handed with the things that even for us or the top-tier, most important things that we 1105 believe. 1106 1107 That we somehow say, I'm gonna trust my leader. I'm going to trust them. They're not perfect. They're not doing it right but I don't want their job of watching for my soul in the Watchtower, hand on the rifle, I don't want that to be a burden. I don't want them to grow 1110 under the burden of having to put up with me. And deal with me and talked me off the 1111 ledge again. 1112 1113 Let me, let me say this about being on a Ledge. If you're the kind of person that has to be 1114 talked off a ledge, talked into trust, in believing over and over again, at some 1115 point, you're unrecoverable. 1116 1117 I've just seen it for too many times in too many people over the years. And I don't mind 1118 talking people off a ledge and trying to help and recover and know really it's okay. And 1119 when we said this, it wasn't that, I meant this. 1120 1121 But at some point, in every single person that I've seen, it's there's something that's tipped 1122 it beyond all recovery. So if your clock is ticking, you don't have to just sort of biding 1123 your time or make a hasty or polite exit. You can deal with it. Let me put it to you this 1124 way. 1125 1126 The warnings of God in the Bible of, I mean, you can just think about say Nineveh. I'm 1127 going to destroy this city. The wickedness is come up to me. The city is going down, 1128

Do you get swallowed by a fish? Vomited back up? He goes in the opposite direction.

I mean, he's supposed to go to Nineveh and he goes the opposite direction. He's in Joppa heading off to the Mediterranean Sea going the opposite way. Why did God say that? So that they would just sort of say their last goodbyes before they all go up in smoke?

Why were those warnings in the Bible given? That they would turn. That they would repent. That they would do something. That's why those warnings are given in the Bible. And we can see evidence of times when they humble themselves and they prevented the outcome? We see other times where they didn't and it happened to them.

And so maybe there is an opportunity of grace. That here we could reconcile. We could forgive people in our past churches and experience that turned out to be a little sketchy, or to be a little bit self-serving, or to be a little whatever. And it makes us hard to actually trust now.

Could be something that you butted heads with on your leader. It could be something that even with husbands and wives. If you guys can't do this at home and I can be able to do this in the church. I'm just sorry. It's just not gonna work. Some of you want to be a joy to lead. Some of you want to somehow grow in this issue of preferring others and having this mind of Christ, this great humility.

Back at verse 1, if there's any, we'd say no, there's every encouragement in Christ. If there's any comfort, know there's all comfort from love. If there's any participation with the Spirit, know we are participating with the Spirit. We are 1 in dwelling of the Holy Spirit, you believe in Jesus. You wouldn't be here. Can you be a leader in this group of churches and not love Jesus? No, that's on the list.
