⁴ actually move people from A to B. Leadership is not just character refinement and

⁵ development. We'll look at the whole chapter of Mark 9 and most of it, and look at some

⁶ different principles we can observe from Jesus' leading, and character development and

⁷ help with them is part of it. But it's not a bull's-eye, it's not an isolated thing in and of

⁸ itself. It's not just kind of "how do I pick at the next thing that a person needs to get fine-

⁹ tuned in?" It is a kind of "along the way." Leadership is not just being a life coach and

¹⁰ talking people through every life step.

Do any of you guys have people in your group where you feel like if you don't check in with them every five minutes, like "do I need to check my phone right now?", they're just

¹³ going to blow the lid on the whole thing?

You can kind of find yourself just being a life coach where you in a sense become Jesus to them and you're talking them through every decision and everything.

You can do that. It works as long as you are constantly on it, but if you let off, it collapses.

We say, if you have a life coach—my wife, by the way, ironically, is actually a life coach who certifies other people to be life coaches. So she kind of stumbled into that through helping out with the foster care, social work, kind of thing at Western, that took off, and now she makes bookoo bucks, and I'm gonna retire and just live out of an RV in a couple of years. Find somebody to hand it off to.

The last thing I'd say is leadership is not counseling. That might be a part of what ends up happening, but it's not just— the leadership question— is not just who's struggling, who's hurting, and where is help needed. There's a kind of forward-looking to leadership that's not just kind of "who's struggling to keep up?" And there's certainly a component of that, but we're not counselors primarily. It's not what we are intending to do, is to just kind of talk people through everything that's ever hurt. Leading is taking people from A to B with intention.

³¹ I'm not sure if you've heard Tony talk about it in a way similar to that, but leadership is,

³² by definition, taking people from A to B with intention. So, "where are we at now, A, and

³³ where are we going, B, and how do we get there?"

And there are all kinds of tools that I hope as we look at the example of Jesus, all kinds of tools that help influence from A to B. And so I hope to kind of put a couple more tools in your tool belt tonight. But leadership is, "where's the person at, A?" And, "where are we going, B?" And, "how do I get them there?" How do I use the God-given influence

entrusted to me to help with that?

It's true on a micro level of an individual, and it's also true on a macro level of the entire group or discipleship community. Those of you guys that are pastors that you're entrusted with.

We're going to look at Mark 9. We're going to go quickly looking at kind of four different 42 things, I think. Some of the principles I'll be looking at, I suppose, they really could 43 probably appear in all kinds of places throughout the gospels. There are other things we 44 could learn about Jesus's leading, too, but I like some of the key components I think are 45 really present here. And so, let me go and pray for us first, actually. Because it's a longer 46 stretch of verses, rather than reading that and you guys all getting up and grabbing your 47 coffees and spacing out, let me pray for us first and then we'll look at these verses and 48 learn from Jesus. 49

So Jesus, I do thank you for each person here that you've called to lead. Thank you for
 their willingness to say yes and serve your people.

⁵² I pray that in any place where vision has gone dry that you would awaken something

⁵³ within them. Any place where love for people's eroded, I pray that their hearts would

⁵⁴ grow tender again. For any that feel like they struggle to lead or wonder if they're very

⁵⁵ effective, God, I thank you that you use unlikely people all the time.

56 4:00

And I pray that you would equip and empower this weekend. Equip and empower. I pray 57 that you would do both. I love to think about what you could do with a weekend like this, 58 even as short as it is. Times where you show up with your spirit and really change things 59 forever. I pray it would be a weekend like that for many here. And that the real fruit of it 60 would be measured not just in what we experience, but in the real fruit that lasts and 61 disciples made. I pray that things would change and that Vida Springs Church would look 62 different a year from now. I thank you that these are the men and women that you intend 63 to use. So come and have your way, open our hearts before you and we want to learn 64 from you, Jesus. Amen. 65

It is a sobering thing leading, by the way, right? You kind of don't really know what you're getting yourself in for. I think I was talking to one of you guys who just started

leading a month ago. The first month it's really just—we've got a guy too, Sam just

started leading about a month ago—and the first month it's really just kind of, "how do I
not screw the night up?" and then "what questions that will get people talking?" There's
kind of, like, layers to learning to lead. It's kind of overwhelming. But there's a lot Jesus
has entrusted.

⁷³ I remember one time I was doing a landscaping project in my front yard... no, I was

⁷⁴ power-washing. I bought a cheap one from Harbor Freight, so it didn't work very well.

⁷⁵ That was a mistake. I listened on audio to all of First Kings and about half of Second

⁷⁶ Kings in one sitting. Big deck, bad power washer, took it all off. And, really, the book of

First and Second Kings reads like this: "this king did what was right in the sight of the

Lord, and the nation of Israel did well. This king didn't, and the nation tanked." It really

⁷⁹ is that as leaders go, nations go, and churches go. There's a lot that he's entrusted to us.

80 6:00

As Vida Spring goes, it will be through you guys right here. And it's a pretty fun thing to get an opportunity to see what God will do this weekend.

⁸³ But the first thing we're going to look at here is the transfiguration of all things. There's

not really an equivalent of that tonight, right? Holy Spirit, come with Elijah and Moses.

⁸⁵ But let's read verses 2 through 8, Mark 9:2-8.

It says, "And after six days, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and he led 86 them up a high mountain by themselves. He was transfigured before them, and his clothes 87 became radiant, intensely white, as no one on earth could bleach them. And there 88 appeared to them Elijah with Moses, and they were talking with Jesus. And Peter said to 89 Jesus, 'Rabbi, it's good that we are here. Let us make three tents, one for you, one for 90 Moses, and one for Elijah.' For he did not know what to say, for they were terrified. And 91 a cloud overshadowed them, and a voice came out of the cloud, 'This is my beloved Son; 92 listen to him.' And suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone with them but 93 Jesus only." 94

And so here, this is Jesus, he's traveling up a mountain to have this crazy encounter with 95 God. This transfiguration, a glorification, God's presence coming upon him and making 96 his appearance different, an appearance of God. And he brings a couple of guys with him 97 - Peter, James, and John. There was relational leadership. I'm sure you guys have heard 98 that term before: "relational leadership." There's time spent together. They go up the 99 mountain together. I don't know if any of you guys have been backpacking or in the 100 mountains, but maybe they even had their terrible, dehydrated meals and all that kind of 101 stuff. But they go up the mountain together. They're spending time together, and when 102

you spend time together, disciples grow. Now, it's not just any kind of time. This right
 here is very intentional time. It is time to try to get into the presence of God together.

105 8:00

We spend time with people. If I had to guess, your calendars are quite full. But what kind of time are we spending? That's a really important question. You can have full calendars but very little fruit, and we don't want that. It's not just coffee, it's not just football, it's not just dinner.

I said in the intro, I think that the friend zone danger is a very real one where we spend all of our time thinking that we have to watch the Super Bowl and hang out at their house, watching another football game, and go play something else with them. And have all these kind of get-to-know-you sort of deals. And we roll that out so long that by the time you actually try to lead anything or do anything meaningful, it's actually kind of awkward.

Jesus was pretty down to business and the time that he spent with them, was intentional 116 kinds of time. Here, he's bringing them into the presence of God together. And this is 117 what I really want to focus on out of this passage, is that a lot of our job as leaders is 118 being people that know how to get into the presence of God ourselves, and help other 119 people get to God. That is a massive part of our job description. Without it, we lead 120 "Bible studies." And Bible studies have a great purpose, they really do. And yet it falls 121 short. A big part of our job is helping to bring people along in experiencing God together. 122 People have to encounter God. 123

Here's what encountering God does: look at verse 6. It says that "he", being Peter, "did not know what to say, for they were terrified." See, when we experience the presence of God, this "terrify" here is a reverence and awe. A kind of head and heart bowed, a life surrendered. I think a lot of times we bump up against people and wonder why they won't surrender their lives, why they don't feel more grief over sin, why they won't fight it harder or confess more quickly. Are they are terrified of God? Do they have a right and healthy fear of God? Have they experienced the presence of God?

131 10:00

¹³² When I started going to Vine as a sophomore in college, I was coming out of all kinds of ¹³³ sin. All kinds of sin; a mess of a life. I went to SIU, Southern Illinois University, because

sin. All kinds of sin; a mess of a life. I went to SIU, Southern Illinois University, becau
 it was the party school in Illinois. That's why I went there. And in the emptiness, and,

man, there has to be more to life than this. There was one person I knew that was a

- ¹³⁶ Christian, and he went to Vine. And to this day, I still can't remember exactly what the
- teaching series was when I started coming, but I remember what the songs were. I

remember the experience of the presence of God. I remember Jeremy Riddle's *Sweetly Broken* and thinking, "Yes, that's me. I'm a mess."

Some of that's more old school for some of you guys, but... I remember *Came to My Rescue*, the kind of realizing I needed Jesus to come and intervene into my life. I
remember sobbing and bawling a lot of tears. I hadn't cried in eight, ten years. And yet it
was the presence of God coming and changing things forever. Jesus here is bringing them
along to encounter God with him, and they were terrified. It produced a healthy fear and
healthy awe. It is so hard to move people without an experience of the Holy Spirit's
presence. It is so hard to move people.

¹⁴⁷ They have to experience God. They have to.

It says in verse 8, "Suddenly looking around, they no longer saw anyone with them but
Jesus only." Don't you love even the language of that? It's like everything else just
stopped. Mountain views, yeah, cool, but they only see Jesus only. All they saw was only
Jesus.

¹⁵² Does it feel like, for us ourselves, for the people that we lead, we're terribly distracted?

Have you noticed that? It feels like we have stretches where we run after Jesus, where

we're zealous for him. We want to be about the kingdom, someone might start serving in

a given area, and then a couple of months later, they kind of punk out. Or, "Man, I'm

¹⁵⁶ going to come to group every single week," "Man, that retreat was amazing," or whatever

it is, or some kind of resolve to follow Jesus, and then it fizzles out.

158 12:00

There's something about the presence of God, really experiencing the presence of God 159 that allows us, perhaps forces us, to fix our eyes on Jesus in a way that we can't look 160 away. That we have sole focus on him. That he captures everything. Everything. Where 161 all of our lives, all of our gifts, all of our abilities, everything he's made us to be, we long 162 that it would be used for Him. I hope that for you guys. I hope that the gifts and abilities 163 that he's given you, aren't getting wasted on a whole bunch of things of the world that 164 don't matter. That your gifts and abilities are being poured out for his kingdom and things 165 that will matter for eternity. I hope for the people that we lead, that they experience God 166 in a way that produces fear and awe and fixes their eyes on Jesus alone. 167

We see this all throughout the bible. This kind of pattern of the people that make a huge impact in the kingdom of God has encountered God. They've encountered the living God. You can look at Samuel and Eli, God moving on from a prophet on to a new one, and here he is as a boy, hearing the voice of God. Wouldn't that be fun if that was any of our kids, hearing the voice of God? That's who God used. You can look at Elijah and Elisha and the transfer that happened there, well, what made them so effective? The power and
 presence of God on them.

There's one I want you to flip to, Exodus 33. Exodus 33, verses 7-11. This is when God was speaking to Israel through Moses, and Moses was going to something called the tent of meeting, and God would speak to him and then he'd come out and he told the nation of Israel what God said. We don't live in those times anymore. It's nice that we have an authoritative bible where God speaks, but also we all have access to the presence of God. But look at this.

181 14:00

Verse 7, "Now Moses used to take the tent and pitch it outside the camp far off from the 182 camp and he called it "the tent of meeting" and everyone who sought the Lord would go 183 to the tent of meeting, which was outside the camp. Whenever Moses went out to the 184 tent, all the people would rise up and each would stand at his tent door and watch Moses 185 until he had gone into the tent. When Moses entered the tent, the pillar of clouds would 186 descend and stand at the entrance of the tent and the Lord would speak with Moses. 187 When the people saw the pillar of clouds standing at the entrance, the people would rise 188 up and worship, each at his tent door. Thus, the Lord would speak to Moses, face to face 189 as a man speaks to his friend." 190

So Moses is encountering God dramatically in these moments, God is revealing himself
 to Moses.

Look at the next verse. If you want to see leader development in a verse, here it is. "When Moses turned again into the camp, his assistant, Joshua, son of Nun, a young man, would not depart from the tent."

You have a young guy, the future successor. At this point, he's just a guy and he is with Moses, as Moses is encountering God. And when Moses sleeps, Joshua—just picture him face down on the carpet, not wanting to go anywhere because he loves the presence of God so much. He can't stand to lift his head. He doesn't want to go anywhere else. There he's being shaped and formed in the presence of God.

I think a lot of what we've got to experience while planting a church is because of this.

Oh, Tony got to be there for a weekend for a pretty dramatic one but I feel so grateful to

²⁰³ get this constantly, it feels like. I was actually reading this passage a couple of years ago.

I think it was a couple of months after we'd had a pretty crazy retreat. I'm not sure if Tony

talked about it or you guys heard.

But months later, things have died down and returned back to normal in some sense. We still had a ton of deliverance stuff happening... and maybe that was a different year. I don't know. We've kind of had a number of crazy things happen. We've been a bit of a bipolar church plant, by the way, with some high highs and low lows.

But I was reading this passage and I felt like God said that He was going to mold and 211 shape leaders in his presence like this. That was right around the time where Tytus was 212 not yet a worship leader. Seamus, our pastor, who is now dating Rachel's sister-did I 213 just call you the right name? Right. They look a lot alike. But that was right around the 214 time where Tytus was not yet our worship leader; Seamus, our now pastor, another DC 215 pastor that we have, he was really just starting to come around at the time. Once before 216 that, I actually really didn't like him. I've told him that, I've told our church that, we joke 217 about it now, but when he first started coming around, I really legitimately didn't like 218 him. He just kind of seemed abrasive and punchy and, I mean, truthfully that was the 219 scouting report on me a dozen years ago, so perhaps I should have been more gracious 220 about it, I don't know. 221

But I grabbed lunch with him one time at the college campus and he really just kind of 222 talked the whole time. I was miserably sick. I'm sick like half the winter. I hate winters in 223 Michigan. But anyway, I felt terrible, I wanted to cancel but I thought, man, he's new, I 224 can't cancel. He just talked about himself the whole time and I was like, "I just can't do 225 this." And so, after he was talking for a while, I said, "Do you have a bible app on your 226 phone?" He's like, "Yeah, I do." I was like, "Why don't you open up to Isaiah 66:2?" And 227 he turns to it, and the verse is, "But this is the one to whom I will look. He who was 228 humble and contrite in spirit and trembles at my word," and I said, so, humble, right? 229 Contrite in spirit like broken over sin. Trembles at my word - fears God. And I told him, 230 "What do you notice isn't on that list? Gifting." 231

²³³ "It doesn't matter how impressive you are, God doesn't need ya."

"Why don't you chew on this for a bit? What do you think about this?" And that was
about how we left it. I mean, it was a little bit more elaborated on than that but that was
about how we left it. Anyway, I walked away thinking, "I don't know if this guy's ever
coming back." He was really involved in a campus ministry. They're much nicer than I
am. They just kind of play games the whole time and did a little Bible essay at the end.

Well, anyway, he kept coming back, kind of being shaped by the Bible, the Holy Spirit working. But this kind of Joshua, son of Nun kind of thing... I really think God did an equivalent of that in Seamus. I had to joke around with him — the kind of amount of Holy Spirit power, exposure sort of things that he got to see and be a part of — I joked
around with him about a year in, I was like, "Man, Seamus, at some point, all this stuff's
going to die down, and you're going to wake up and it's going to feel like you got married
and your spouse has put on a whole lot of weight because you're eating a bunch of meals,
you got to like, you know..." I'm sorry if that's kind of too abrupt, I don't know, but I was
like, "Someday, you're going to wake up and realize, 'oh, shoot, I'm already neck-deep
and committed. I can't get out. But this isn't what I signed up for.""

²⁴⁹ But God really moves and shapes and he forms in his presence.

²⁵⁰ I remember a retreat where Seamus had a snotsicle all the way down to the carpet. There

was a men's clinic that I had where there were multiple weeks of just crazy Holy Spirit

²⁵² power kind of stuff happening. And what God does in His presence is He changes people.

- ²⁵³ He changes people.
- We work really hard, I'm certain you guys do, but He just swings a bigger hammer. We need His presence.
- This past Sunday, teaching on worship, I taught 2 Corinthians 3, which isn't inherently about worship, but it's about being changed in the presence of God, referring to Moses wearing the veil when he came down from the Ten Commandments.
- ²⁵⁹ 2 Corinthians 3 says this: "That we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of God,
 ²⁶⁰ are being transformed from one degree of Glory to another. The Lord is spirit and where
 ²⁶¹ the spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom."
- 262 20:00

So we're being transformed from one degree of Glory to another. The bible's kind of
tactful way of saying "not very impressive, to still not very impressive, but more like
Jesus." He uses his presence to make us more like him. There's freedom in his presence.
Even when you think about: who are the people you lead that there's kind of more
growth, there's more life, there's things happening?

Even a couple of the guys that are here, Isaac and Sam... I remember Isaac, there's kind 268 of an ongoing struggle generally with anxiousness. Is that okay to say? He just kind of, 269 he'd get in his head a lot. About ten months ago or something like that, we had a team 270 meeting where I talked about the Holy Spirit, and I just shared a bunch of stories. We've 271 grown with a lot of new people, some of it was through relational evangelism inviting, 272 but a lot of what happens is you get more established as a church as you grow with a lot 273 more churched people. Which isn't always a bad thing, you just got to make sure they're 274 becoming us. 275

- So we talked about the Holy Spirit, I shared a whole bunch of Holy Spirit stories, and the
- Holy Spirit ended up moving as much as I'd ever seen at a team meeting, at least in the
- six years we've been at church. Probably up there in terms of even what I can remember
- at Vine. And Isaac wasn't even getting a prayer, he was just having faith and being
- outward-focused and praying for someone else. And God's presence was on him as he
- was praying for someone else, and that area has been different since. How does that
- work? Didn't even get prayer about it.
- Sometimes it feels like: ok, someone who struggles with anxiousness, let's get together
 every other week for 2 to 3 hours. Our calendars are full, we're exhausted and
 overwhelmed, things move so slowly, and then the Holy Spirit, just in a moment, makes
 things different.
- 287 22:00
- Sam, I remember when Jesus saved him maybe I think. It might have been there, it might
 have not. He's trying to work that out and figure out when exactly the moment was.
- But he started coming around out of a party scene, a similar story to me, and for whatever reason, he came to a Team Meeting a year ago. And he was in the very, very back seeming emotional, and I went back and prayed for him and tried to figure out what was going on. And he said he was feeling a lot of conviction of sin, and as I was talking to him about "Man, do you believe in Jesus? Offer up your life to him, repent the best you can, tell him you're sorry the best you can," and we're kind of praying together through all of that and... they're leading small groups and they're here.
- And they're in process every bit as much as you're in process, every bit as much as Tony and I are in process.
- ²⁹⁹ We're all being transformed from one degree of glory to another.
- But I can think about guys in our church that have been around longer than them. There is a guy that... they both multiplied out of Tytus' group. I can think of a guy that — Tytus has been banging his head against the wall. Josh, for years, a gifted aviation student, a real neat kid, Christian home. I think he's a Christian. A handsome guy, tender heart, seems really gifted. There's no life.
- ³⁰⁵ He's been around longer than either of those guys, he'll serve now and then for a little bit.
- ³⁰⁶ He's been to a couple of Team Meetings and there are times where, if I feel God's
- ³⁰⁷ presence moving in a room, I'm like, all right, where's Josh? And I go pray and I can't
- ³⁰⁸ make anything happen. How does that work? We can't do anything more than what the

Father is doing, and our own ability and effort. We got to be faithful with our gift, right? Our time and our leading.

But He just swings a bigger hammer. He shows up and moves and things change.

So we have to be people like Moses, like Samuel, like Elijah, like Paul with Timothy, like Jesus with the disciples: that we, as leaders, know how to get to God, we're bringing people with us.

315 24:00

We're helping them to experience God through the laying on of our hands, through identifying what's happening with them in worship, to just talking to them about it, to getting them to things where God's moving. But we have to be people that know how to get to God and bring people with us.

Not only that but think about, in this passage, who does he bring? So, back to the very first verse there, too.

So, kind of another principle here, I want to point out in Jesus' leading, beyond helping people experience God, is: Who does he spend his time with? How does he distinguish between people? This is a big thing for us. You aim at everything, you hit nothing, right?

So, it says, "After six days, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John." And so this crazy moment of the transfiguration, this wonderful thing that happens, how does it all go down? Who does he bring with? Only three guys.

- Here you've got God in flesh about to be transfigured, and he only brings three guys. Why? Limited seats? Tickets are too expensive like the Super Bowl? Think about it. He could have brought the whole nation. I don't know how big the mountain was. Some of you guys who are more historical might be able to kind of fact-check that, but he could have brought at least the 12, could he not? And yet, he only brought three. Why?
- ³³³ See, there's this thing in leadership that we see with Jesus where he spent a
- disproportionate amount of his time with Peter, James, and John. He spent less time than
- with those guys, but more than the rest, with the 12. There was kind of another layer that

might have stretched to about 15 to 20 — Mary and Martha and Lazarus. There are a few

- others that kind of... but beyond that everybody else was a pretty light touch. And I think
- that's a big deal for us to learn how to think about where we spend time to distinguish
- between people, and to not run ourselves into the ground.

340 26:00

Years ago, there was a group leader retreat, I think that our network of churches might have been — I was a staff pastor at Vine — we might have been like eight churches or something like that. And so, a whole network together for a group leader retreat, and one of the sessions was on relational leadership. And so having people in your home, doing life together, all this kind of stuff. I'm one year into being a pastor, leading two DCs, ten small groups something like that, Vine trying to keep up with growth. That's kind of how North Pines has been, too.

But, anyway, I go home with Mallory and we try to come up with a list of who do we want to have over to the house. And we came up with a list of, I think 15-ish, 20, I don't know, on a whiteboard, on our refrigerator. And you know what we did for the next couple of weeks? We have literally nobody over. Do you know why? It was so paralyzing. It was so overwhelming. We come back from a retreat on relational leadership, and make a list of people who we'll have over, and we didn't have anybody over for a month. Because it was paralyzing. It was overwhelming.

In a sense... we had a service... we've kind of been between 350 and 400 for this

semester. On Sundays when we're 400 I feel like I wouldn't mind running off about 50.

³⁵⁷ We're healthy for 350. We're healthy for 350, we're out for 400. In a sense, I lead 400

people. In another sense, I lead 8 to 12. Really, though, I lead about 2 to 3.

Is that weird to think about?

Jesus spent a disproportionate time with Peter, James, and John. I spend a

disproportionate time with Tytus, Seamus, and our two non-staff overseers Will and

Andrew, and not even always at the same time. And it kind of changes a little bit

³⁶³ sometimes. Sometimes there's a particular person that God's moving a lot in and you're

trying to be more intentional with, and all of those kinds of things.

365 28:00

But in some ways, the groups that you guys lead, it might feel like you lead 8, or 12, or 20 — any of you guys 20 and up. Okay? Well good. I was going to tell Tony; you got to get that multiplied. But we might, too, so don't fact-check me on that. Don't pull out the spreadsheet, Tytus! But we're doing all right, keeping up on the group leader front.

Anyway, in one sense, it feels like you lead 8, 10, and 12, but in another sense, you really lead about 2 to 3. I think we have a pretty limited capacity on how to impact, and the model that Jesus shows here, I think is imitable pace, and it is maximum effect. I am not worried at all about the health of our small group structure. We've got myself and Seamus as pastors. We've got 20 small group leaders and 350 to 400 people. But the thing that I

- am not worried about at all, is our small group leaders. We have really, really healthy,
- alive, faithful solid group leaders that I love like crazy.
- Now, I didn't feel like that a year ago coming out of COVID. Any of you guys felt likethat too?
- And what I had to do was, with about one or two at a time, just start digging out all the mess. Just kind of poke it.
- You guys got older kids where it's kind of like that? Stuff will kind of knotted up, built up in them. You got to poke, poke, poke until you get what's out. It was kind of like that. "Okay, this guy's knotted up. I got to work, and I need to do about one at a time. Okay."
- But you can't tackle it all at once. In a sense, Jesus, kind of light-touched the whole nation. He'd spend a little bit of time with anybody, but he spent more time with the 12, and a disproportionate time with two or three. I think that's a sustainable pace for us.
- So how do you distinguish between people, and where to spend your time? Is it the ones that are the most put together? Well, let's look at context. You know this little part here in verse 5, Peter said, "Rabbi, it's good that we're here. Let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses, and Elijah," because he didn't know what to say.
- 391 30:00
- So, here in our equivalent would be like, I pray here at the end, the Holy Spirit comes, the
 Holy Spirit's falling like crazy, darn it, near as close as we can get to Moses and Elijah
 showing up, and then one of you guys just starts talking about something real random
 because you don't know what to do with it. Like that's actually Peter.
- Like, literally, in the moment and Jesus has for-knowledge. And so, he says, "Peter, James, and John, come up the mountain with me," and kind of the in-parentheses is, if you had a play script that shows the guy's thoughts — and Jesus knew Peter was about to ruin the moment. So he invited the guy that's going to ruin the moment.
- Not only that. Look even more in context, Chapter 8, Verse 33. This is 31 to 33, "He,"
 being Jesus, "began to teach them that the son of man must suffer many things and be
 rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes and be killed and after three days, rise
 again. And he said this plainly, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But
 turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, get behind me, Satan. For
 you're not setting your mind on things of God, but on the things of man."

So literally, in context... How does Jesus decide, "yes, this is the guy I'm going to bring up the mountain with me?" He literally just called him Satan, he invites him up knowing he's gonna ruin the moment. And he still does. Why? Because he could see Peter, not for where he was at, but where he was going to be. And that is a big thing we have to be able to do as leaders: is to say "here's where a person is at, but what has God made him to be?"

For me, I think about it like this — what's the cleaned-up version of this person look like? What's the cleaned-up version of this person look like, Or if there's no visible struggle kind of stuff, what would it look like if all of this person's gifts and abilities were poured out for God's kingdom? And I feel a kind of righteous jealousy. I think that's the closest I can get to understanding God's jealousy.

⁴¹⁸ I think any other kind of form of jealousy we have, it's kind of like insecure or sinful.

⁴¹⁹ That's the only kind of jealousy I can think of — being jealous that it's sunny here: sinful.

Right? It's not okay. But being jealous that a guy's gifts and abilities be poured out for the

kingdom of God, that's a right jealousy.

See, for Jesus, he knew that Peter, even though he was going to ruin the moment and just
got called Satan, is also going to be the one preaching in Acts 2.

And so, if you don't do this... if you can't look and see what's the "all-in for Jesus" version of this person look like, what the cleaned-up version of this person looks like.

If you don't do that, you'll spend your time with churched people. And you'll find
yourself leading a group that you hate. Because, you know who's already the most
cleaned up? Previously churched people.

They come in, they know, "I should get a small group." They know how to participate in the discussion. They already know the Bible. They're not bothering you with big sin struggles. It's easy. You spend your time there, consistently and always — and I'm not saying anything against that. I'm sure, a number of you here, already churched, already Christians found your way into Vida Springs Church.

But if you can't think like this, you'll find yourself leading a group you hate. It'll feel churchy, it'll feel religious-y, it'll feel stiff. So you have to look at where is the person at, and what God's made him be, and distinguish between people.

One caveat on this real quick: for some of you where your gifts and abilities are more mercy and shepherding type, that is a great and God-given gifting, but sometimes there

- can be a bit of a recoil that says, "No, no, I need to treat all people with the same amount
- of kind time and effort and attention. And I would, one, point us to the Bible that says,
- this kind of shows an example of Jesus where he does not do that. It is not a sinful thing,
- you can't overlook people. You really do have to lead all in a sense, but don't
- underestimate an intentional five minutes. Don't underestimate the impact of praying for
- somebody at the end of service on Sunday.
- 445 34:00
- ⁴⁴⁶ Don't underestimate the real significance of a five-minutem before service starts, an ⁴⁴⁷ actual, "Hey, how are you doing?" rather than just small talk.
- And so, the bigger the church has got for me, the more I've learned I just have to learn how to have a lot of really impactful one or two-minute moments, five-minute moments, because I can't spend all my time with all people equally. If you do that, you will personally feel overwhelmed.
- The only group leader we've had in five and a half years that had a moral reason that had to shut the group down, I'll be vague because our guys don't even know it or need to know the details of the situation or the person, at least. But it's the guy that out of all the years showed the most resistance on this particular topic when I would train on it.
- He was kind of feeling like, "no, no, no, all people have to get all the same amount of
 time" and he found himself in a group that he hated. Mercy shepherding kind of thing,
 but always just kind of caregiving people through hurts, didn't distinguish between people
 and just ended up with a whole bunch of hurting people that just want to talk to him about
 how much they hated their job, and all of their hurts, and all their problems. And the
 group wasn't going anywhere. He wasn't leading people as individuals anywhere.
- The moral failure that happened was during COVID. He ended up most nights, he'd sneak off to the garage. His wife was pregnant so she'd go to bed earlier, he'd sneak off to the garage, and he'd smoke weed. And he went weeks, months actually, without confessing and a lot of it was just kind of wanting to escape. It was COVID, I mean, that was a really hard stretch of loneliness and isolation, but a lot of it was just hating the responsibility that he had and wanting to escape it.
- You can hit it from all kinds of different angles, but I think it probably exhausts the point enough to say, I think Jesus gives us here an example that is imitate-able that we ought to pay attention to. In a sense you lead 8, in a sense you lead 12, but really, you probably lead two to three.
- 472 36:00

So who are those two to three? Who are those two to three?

And sometimes, I've told our leaders, "Man, there's no next leader," or, "Man, there is not anybody I'm excited about." And I'll say, "so the people you are supposed to be spending the most time with aren't in your group yet. So start playing basketball at the rec, or whatever it is that you do." All of us have different things to connect with people. Fly drones with people that fly drones.

Whatever it is that you do, do what you do to meet people, but if you find yourself in a group that you don't even yourself like, or have people you are excited about, then the people you're supposed to be spending your time with the most aren't even in your group at all.

Go the next month without spending time with anybody in your group and I mean, I mean in a "longer" sense.

⁴⁸⁵ But the light touch kind of stuff still happened. Jesus would pray for anybody. He'd heal

all who were sick. Meaningful interactions galore, but disproportionate time with a few.

⁴⁸⁷ If you do that, you can lead a group that grows with health and effect.

You could say more on that but we'll keep moving to Verse 14. Chapter 9, Verse 14. It 488 says, "When they came to the disciples," so nine stayed back at the base of the mountain. 489 Jesus and the three, they come back down and they see a crowd had gathered around 490 them; the other nine and the scribes arguing with them. "And immediately, all the crowds 491 when they saw Him, were greatly amazed and ran up to Him and greeted Him. He," 492 being Jesus, "asked, 'What are you arguing about with them?' And someone from the 493 crowd answered Him, 'Teacher, I brought my son to you, for he has a spirit that makes 494 him mute," by "to you," meaning "your disciples, your other nine." "And whenever it 495 seizes him, it throws him down, and he foams and grinds his teeth and becomes rigid. So 496 I asked your disciples to cast it out and they were not able.' And He answered them, 'Oh, 497 faithless generation. How long am I to be with you? How long am I to bear with you? 498 Bring him to me.' 499

"And they brought the boy to Him. And when the spirit saw him, immediately it
convulsed the boy. And he fell on the ground and rolled about foaming at the mouth. And
Jesus asked his father, 'How long has this been happening to him?' And he said, "From
childhood, and it's often cast him into fire and into the water to destroy him.""

504 38:00

⁵⁰⁵ "But if you can do anything, have compassion on us and help us.' And Jesus said to him,

⁵⁰⁶ 'If you can — all things are possible for one who believes.' And immediately the father ⁵⁰⁷ of the child cried out and said, 'I believe. Help my own belief.'"

⁵⁰⁸ Have you ever prayed that before? All the time.

⁵⁰⁹ "And when Jesus saw that a crowd came running together, He rebuked the unclean spirit, ⁵¹⁰ saying to it, 'You mute and deaf, spirit, I command you, come out of him and never enter ⁵¹¹ him again.' And after crying out and convulsing terribly, it came out. The boy was like a ⁵¹² corpse so that most of them said he's dead. But Jesus took him by the hand and lifted him ⁵¹³ up and he rose. And when He had entered the house, the disciples asked Him privately, ⁵¹⁴ 'Why could we not cast it out?' And He said to them, 'This kind cannot be driven out by ⁵¹⁵ anything but prayer.'"

So what I want to point out, really in this section here is something that we could kind ofjust call apprentice-style leading.

There's this pattern in Jesus's leading where He was regularly equipping and teaching the disciples how to make other disciples. And He did this in a bit of a sequence. Up to this point, they had personally seen Jesus work, and that's usually where a person has to start.

They have to get prayed for themself. They have to watch it happen. They have to hear other people answer questions to your discussion so they don't say anything dumb or do something out of line and then say, "Okay, this is how we're talking about it. I get it." And they know how to talk.

But at this point, they've personally seen Jesus's work. He'd given them authority, He'd sent them out, and they'd returned. So they're not going at this blind, even though they have a failed attempt. Here, it seems like Peter, James, and John up on the mountain, they come back down.

- The rest of the disciples were the ones taking a hack at this. The guy's son with a demon, the other nine could not kick it out.
- 531 40:00

And so this isn't that they'd never done it before, because they'd already come back,

⁵³³ "Hey, even the demons listen to us." And Jesus says, "Yeah, sure, I saw Satan..." It's like,

man, come on, way to kill the buzz there, right?

⁵³⁵ But, "Man, yeah, I saw Satan cast out from heaven, fell like lightning. Rejoice that your ⁵³⁶ names are in the book of life." And so they'd already experienced this before, but they run into one that's a bit big for their britches, and they can't kick it out. Jesus comes and, admittedly, this isn't the most... you can't say it's not gracious because He's Jesus and He does all things perfectly. This might not be the most verbatim replicable model where if somebody's not doing something well in your small group, you probably shouldn't say, "How long should I stay

⁵⁴² with you, oh, faithless generation?"

⁵⁴³ We can't call it not gracious because He's perfect in all of His ways. Yet I would

suggest... Tony probably would not want you talking to people you lead like that.

He then kicks the demon out and they talk about it afterwards. So they're released to do, they can't, and then they talk about it after: "Here's how you do it."

And so what we see generally with Jesus is this pattern in His leading where they're outward-focused together. It starts with them, but it doesn't stay with them. They are outward-focused together, and He is teaching them, as they do "ministry." I know we don't use that word a ton, but as they are doing "ministry" together, side by side.

I think most of us fall into a trap without thinking about it. Those of you that are more evangelism, gifting types are probably immune from this. But the rest of us are tempted to fall into a pattern where our leading is primarily face-to-face. It's one-on-one. And leading does start there, and occasionally has to circle back there. But what I mean by one on one is, "Hey, you want to go grab coffee? Let's talk about your life."

⁵⁵⁶ "Hey, do you want to come over for dinner? How are you guys doing?" And we make ⁵⁵⁷ each other the end goal of the leadership game.

558 42:00

⁵⁵⁹ But us, as each other, are not the end goal of the leadership game. We ought to love each

⁵⁶⁰ other. We ought to confess our sins to one another. We ought to help each other grow.

⁵⁶¹ We ought to speak into each other's life. Jesus circles back to address something in Peter.

⁵⁶² We'lll see Him leading the disciples in individual things here in a moment as our last

⁵⁶³ kind of thing before we wrap up. But Jesus's common practice in leading was: an awful

⁵⁶⁴ lot of light touch with shoulder-to-shoulder.

There's kind of face-to-face leading, and there's shoulder-to-shoulder leading. If I had to guess, most of our leading is face-to-face with the person that we lead as the end goal, the destination.

⁵⁶⁸ What I have realized happens a lot, whenever there's a potential leader or an equivalent in ⁵⁶⁹ a small group, and I say, "Hey, who are you spending most of your time with, in a group?" Do you know what they say? "You guys." Well, not "you" guys, "our leaders."

But you get the deal. If I were to kind of, who's the person you're most excited about in a

group that you think is, I don't know, kind of functioning the most healthy and mature as

a disciple? And you thought right now, okay, who are they spending most of their time

- with? I'll bet the answer is you.
- Now, how is that time being spent? My guess is it's one-to-one. It's face-to-face. And yet what Jesus did was, "Hey, let's come shoulder to shoulder and tag team this together."
- And the progression was, typically: Jesus does, they watch. Then: they do it together.
- Then: they do; Jesus watches. And then: He sends them out.
- And that is a leadership progression. That's how we develop people in their gifts and in their abilities.
- ⁵⁸¹ If we don't do this, we end up with people where a group leader will say, "Man, I think ⁵⁸² this guy, I think he could lead a group anytime soon."
- Like, "Yeah, he only spends time with you. He's not leading everybody. Well, what did you do to prepare him to lead?"
- ⁵⁸⁵ "Well, he's led a discussion every now and then," and you should clear that with your

⁵⁸⁶ DC pastor first. But we think preparing somebody to lead is getting them prepping

discussions, and yet they're not leading anybody in group.

⁵⁸⁸ So what do you got to do? You've got to get people accountable for people in the group.

Well, now that whole "only spending time with two or three people" thing makes a little bit more sense, because if those two or three people spend time with two or three people, then everybody's covered.

See, there's this kind of... you're leading together alongside, equipping people how to do
it in this apprentice-style leadership, this kind of side shoulder-to-shoulder kind of thing.
We do it with most areas, not all, but most.

Teaching people how to pray. In year two, I had to lead two small groups on top of a church. And that was actually the most exciting thing that I like. Tytus was starting to come around. He played tennis at a college in town, a liberal arts school, D3. I couldn't get him into a normal small group for the life of me, and there were one or two other guys that were also athletes at this D3 school. I couldn't get him in a small group but I found out that they would get together Monday night at 10 o'clock in the basement of a chapel at a very liberal, liberal arts college. I don't know how they even had a chapel. I don't know how the thing hadn't been turned into a gym or something.

But anyway, so I actually hijacked, and I said, "Man, if you guys ever wanted to not have to prep anything, and just have somebody..." — I didn't think they were prepping anything. So, anyway, the guy Matt, who was my original in, he ended up transferring to the Navy before anything materialized. But he was my original in that I was most connected with, and I hijacked this small group.

The very first night I show up and I heard from Matt, "Yeah, there's this guy, Tytus. He's got a really good voice. He brings his guitar, we do some worship." And I thought, "Oh, great, an 18-year-old guy with a guitar. This is going to be miserable." And it was. It was every bit of it.

I could play guitar better than him at the time. He's got a beautiful voice. To lead
worship, he has to sing multiple octaves lower than what's natural; there, he was singing
probably higher than what was natural. If you think Chris Tomlin got a high voice, like,
whoa, buddy, he was up there.

In between songs, he would tell people what the next song was. They would all Google it on their phones, and then kind of pull it back up. Terribly, terribly awkward.

620 46:00

So talk about seeing a guy — but after that, I went to Will Miller, a non-staff overseer who was leading worship, and I said, "Will, I think we found our next worship leader."

⁶²³ "Now, here's where things are at, so this might be a years-out kind of thing."

So, talking about seeing people in the raw, the big thing I noticed, by the way, was the 624 tender heart and the sense of God's presence on him, even super raw. But anyway, so I 625 hijacked a small group, and they're doing it kind of more like a... they would just actually 626 take turns reading. They'd pick a chapter of the Bible, and they'd just take turns reading, 627 like by paragraph or verse, or something like that. And so I'm trying to do it the way that 628 we do it. And it took some steering it there. The week two, I moved it to my house, I was 629 like, "Guys, what do you think about kind of just saving me the drive, and I'll get food 630 and snacks for you?" And so they end up starting to come to my house. 631

But anyway, so I'd leave my small group from seven to nine and then I'd leave and go there from ten to midnight or 9:30 to 11:30, something like that, and lead a second small group, and that was life planting. Not anymore.

But, anyway, teaching them to pray. Nobody knew how to pray. How do you do that? How do you get that functioning in a way that works and that's healthy? We got there in about two weeks. If any of you guys feel like, man, I don't like the prayer ministry culture in my small group, here's what we did.

At first, I noticed that what they wanted to do is the kind of circle-up sort of thing, and you put your hand on each other's lower back, and it's terribly uncomfortable. And there's always like the one weird person that wants to like massage. Let's stop that, you know?

And, anyway, so that was how they naturally wanted to do it. I was like, "Okay, hey, guys, let's do this real quick." We had a topic. I was like, "Ok, let's go ahead and pray for..." — it might have even been you — anyway, I picked the person we were going to pray for, and all five of us kind of huddled around, and I just let them pray first, and I waited. And then I prayed. And then — I think it might have been Tytus — because tears started to come.

649 48:00

We had a little sense of God's presence, a little gentle sense of God's presence. And they all had their eyes open. They were praying real churchy. It's all they knew. A couple of them weren't even Christians.

And I interrupted, and I said, "So I know all you guys have your eyes closed right now. But why don't you open them real quick, don't be creepy about it. But do you notice? Can you notice something happening to him spiritually? Okay, that's God, moving. And the temptation can be to overlook that and just keep talking. What you got to do when you see God moving is to say, okay, that's something God's doing, we got to pray on that longer. So, guys, let's stay on that. And let's pray longer."

Sometimes we see people going off on all kinds of tangents and we just feel internally frustrated, just interrupt the moment. Peter did, right? Biblical precedent for it, right?

⁶⁶¹ But anyway, just interrupt the moment, coach them, talk them through it. I was talking to

one of you, guys, trainer, right? You do that all the time in teaching people a motion,

right? Interrupt what's happening and coach them and talk to them how to do it, and then

afterwards, "Hey, what was that like? Did you guys notice that?" And you do that.

And then we prayed for the one, I said, "Okay, let's keep praying for this one guy, but,
okay, I think that God's doing something in you. Can a couple of you guys go pray for..."
— the other one might have been Skyler. He's leading a — we got two group leaders,

one of them is a worship leader, out of it. So, it was a good small group.

But it started out with: nobody knew how to pray. And then a couple of weeks, the whole group knew how to pray, except for the one or two that weren't Christians. That's a little bit of a harder challenge. You just got to make Christians first.

With evangelism. This, too. Mallory is fantastic about, when she's out at parks in town — half a year ago when it was nice enough to — when she's out at parks in town, inviting people to church, telling people about Jesus, those kinds of things. And she'll initially start with another woman in the church, "Hey, do you want to take our kids out to the park?"

But the face-to-face isn't the end-all-be-all.

It's not, "ignore all of the non-Christians and just tell me all of your problems." It's "hey

let's go make some stinking disciples together," right? And so she'll actually just kind of

like stop in an interaction sometimes, with someone from our church to talk to a mom

- 681 that's there.
- 682 50:00

And as they're doing it, that person is watching what it looks like to do evangelism. So is she ignoring that person, or is she leading that person? She's leading that person. By doing evangelism, and ignoring the person from our church for a moment, she's teaching that person evangelism.

⁶⁸⁷ And this has happened a number of times.

⁶⁸⁸ There's a mom's playgroup that had lots of other moms that had met in parks, not

⁶⁸⁹ Christians, that were starting to come. Through the winter, it's mostly just been

⁶⁹⁰ homeschooled people, so I told her to kill it a couple of weeks ago. So, she'll have to do

an underground one that she'll start up here in a couple of weeks again. But when you just

make kind of face-to-face the end-all-be-all, that is a form of leading, but it's not the end-

⁶⁹³ all-be-all. There is a shoulder-to-shoulder, outward focus together, teaching people as

⁶⁹⁴ they observe from you with how to lead.

You can't just throw somebody into the water and assume they're going to learn how to swim. People have to watch you lead.

⁶⁹⁸ I've had people sit in on meetings. Actually, with Isaac and Sam, I met with both of them ⁶⁹⁹ at the same time just trying to get efficient from a time standpoint, they both lead a small ⁷⁰⁰ group in my Tuesday DC, and so I lead Isaac with Sam there, sitting and watching, and I ⁷⁰¹ lead Sam with Isaac sitting there watching, helping them on their discussions. And they're ⁷⁰² learning a couple of things: the leadership things I'm talking about on the small group, ⁷⁰³ but also, if they're paying attention, to how to actually lead and speak into something.

I've done that with Seamus, as a pastor. "Why don't you sit in on this meeting that I'm
having?" Sometimes it doesn't work out and it's not the easiest, but at times that you can
do that, man, it's helpful for someone to get to watch.

How do you pray through somebody's past? Man, that's a hard one to do. How many of

you guys would say you feel comfortable praying through someone's past? After

⁷⁰⁹ Freedom, "Hey, can I do the follow-up? Let's pray it all through."

Right? That's a hard one to just "here's how to do it." You know what's helpful? Coming
 alongside.

With that sometimes you run into some demons. Will Miller, one of our — didn't have something kicked out of him although a third of our group leaders at this point have at some point in the last number of years. Will Miller, he'd been around Vine longer than me. He actually was a group leader to my roommate as a new Christian. My roommate was in his small group.

Some of you guys know Will, but he'd never really run into much with demonic oppression. There was one of our leaders who was getting into a bit of a tough spot. I could feel stuff knotting up in him, and I was kind of poking trying to get an in, and I felt like I knew where it came from in his past, stuff from growing up. And anyway, he finally got a willingness to talk and work it through. And I said, "What would you think about me actually having Will join in as we do that? Would that be okay?" as we prayed through. And he was kind of, "Yeah, sure. That's fine. That's okay."

As we do, and we start praying through and working through his past and some really
painful moments that caused distrust. I mean, he had a stepdad — dad wasn't in his life
— he had a stepdad literally punch him in the face in a fight over his mom. He walked
out of there saying, "I'm never going to trust another man in my life."

Do you think that plays out into health and adulthood? As we're praying through that and

a couple of other moments, I think another time he got kicked down a flight of stairs by
 his stepdad. Just painful stuff.

- ⁷³² We start praying through that stuff and we run into a demon.
- ⁷³³ Do you know who's there to learn how to kick it out? Will Miller.

Will, he'd been around Vine for a dozen years, never kicked anything out. Now since
 then, he's probably kicked out four or five.

⁷³⁶ Right? You kind of learn: apprentice-style, shoulder-to-shoulder, doing stuff together.

⁷³⁷ Similarly, with helping people develop gifts, it's a really big deal. Gifts of prophecy,

⁷³⁸ mercy, serving. Sometimes it's a kind of "send them out, teach them how to think about

it, and they come back." We're responsible for developing people's gifts.

I think sometimes people just get festering on all the issues or sores or things that feel
hard or "I hate my job," but really they need to learn how to use their gifts and abilities,
and find some purpose.

And it's not just leaders that we're to develop, what about a serving gift? People don't
know what to do with that sometimes. "Hey, man, so and so is really in a hard spot, could
you shovel their driveway?" You guys have to do that all the time, right? Shovel
driveways? Things like that.

Or mercy gifting? Man, you got to give some leadership attention to a mercy gifting because a mercy gifting without a leader's discernment to help, they'll run themselves in the ground, they'll be exhausted. I mean, they'll just hear all the world's problems, and they'll just feel like — you got to come alongside of mercy gifting and help.

Man, you start developing people's gifts and releasing them and sending them out, and
 you check in, "Hey, how'd it go?"

You take a core member that's not leading anybody right now, a potential leader that you wonder about, that you've been developing them in a group discussion, but they're not discipling anybody. And you say, "Hey, why don't you spend time with so and so. Here's something I've noticed with him," or even better to say, "Is there anything that you notice? What do you wonder is a next step for them? What do you suspect God might be doing?" And then you pepper in what you see.

- "Why don't you go spend time with them and see if you can get there. If it doesn't work,
 don't force it. Don't kick the door down. Let's see if you can get there."
- They come back, "Hey, how'd it go?" Usually, they kind of opened it, and they chickened out. They got stuck, but you talk them through it, right?

See, it's this apprentice style: it's developing people's gifts, sending them out to go to do the stuff, they come back, and you talk about how it goes. When it doesn't go well you say, "How long do I have to be with you, faithless..." Don't do that. In most cases, it's incredibly gracious and incredibly tactful. But here, this is kind of a model and a pattern of leadership that we see.

A little quick on the last one to make sure we have plenty of time for prayer. And I know you guys want to get to your bonfire at 9:30. We got nine o'clock right now?

The last thing that I really have to point us to is, kind of, then, the face-to-face, how do you think about face-to-face?

And so, 30 through 37. It says, "They went on from there and they pass through Galilee.

He did not want anyone to know for He was teaching His disciples and saying to them,

⁷⁷⁶ 'The Son of Man is going to be delivered into the hands of men, and they will kill Him.

And when He's killed, after three days, He will rise,' but they didn't understand the

- saying and were afraid to ask Him."
- So here, Jesus is doing something where He knows what's ahead, and He's trying to
 prepare them for it.

And what he's talking about is the cross. He's trying to prepare them for a reality where they aren't just in His small group, right? He's trying to prepare them for them being on their own going through the horrors of watching Him die.

There are multiple other passages where we see Jesus preparing the disciples in this kind of way. He prepares Peter by going even further to say Satan demanded to have you, that he could sift you like wheat, but I've prayed that your faith wouldn't fail. He's seen what's ahead. He's anticipating the outcomes ahead. And He's trying to prepare them for that. I would label that proactive leadership.

It is a leader initiated: here's what's ahead, here's a person's next step, here are the pitfalls ahead. Here's what concerns me about your dating relationship. Here's how I think God's made you to be and what it's going to look like to get that proactive leadership. The leader sees and identifies what's in the future and prepares and equips a person for that.

Reactive leadership would be the opposite. We see that in verse 33, it says, 'They came
to Capernaum, and when He was in the house, He asked them, 'What were you
discussing on the way?' But they kept silent, for on the way they argued with one another
about who was the greatest. And He sat down, and He called the twelve, and He said to
them, 'If anyone would be first, he must be last of all, and servant of all.' And he took a
child and put them in the midst of them. And taking him in his arms, He said to them,
'Whoever receives one such child in my name receives me. And whoever receives me

receives not me, but Him who sent me."

And so, here, this is a problem dumped on His lap. When you do relational discipleship,

and you're spending time together, you're going to notice things in people that you lead.

⁸⁰⁵ Have you noticed things in people that you lead? Sometimes you can feel frustrated, it

⁸⁰⁶ makes you want to recoil. But you're going to see things in people you lead.

And so, some things get dumped on your lap. Here, Jesus overhears them arguing. He's got to deal with it, right? So He reacts.

It's like parenting, you see your siblings or your children fight, my two and four-year-old,
they fight aplenty. You have to deal with it. You might kind of let it go to a certain point,
but if it crosses the line, you got to jump in, you got to intervene.

With reactive leadership and proactive leadership, one is, here it is right in front of you, staring at you. A married couple is fighting, "Hey, we're fighting like crazy. Need help." "Hey, I have been struggling with sin, can you help?" That's reactive leadership. It's right there staring you in the face.

Proactive would be the opposite. And that is: the leader sees it, the person themselves

- can't see it. Developing their gifts, protecting them from pitfalls, all those kinds of things.
- Between those two, we see Jesus do both, back to back.
- ⁸¹⁹ Which do you think we do more? Yeah. Big time, right? Big time.

And the truth is, there are a number of things that play into that. One, I remember Sándor

saying forever ago — those of you guys who know Sándor, lead pastor at Vine, formerly,

because now he's in Texas, too. But anyway, I remember him saying, "Proximity blinds

- discernment." Like if you ever go to someone's house, and they got a real nasty dog, it
- smells terrible, and can't see out of one eye, and smells like a dog, right?
- They all just love it and think it's awesome. And you're, like, grossed out by the thing?
- ⁸²⁶ What's the difference? They're really close, and they can't see it anymore.
- ⁸²⁷ So that's one thing we've got working against us that makes proactive leadership difficult.

The good thing about how we do church is, you guys aren't hung out to dry or on your own. Those of you guys that lead groups, if you're working with your DC pastor, to think about what's next in the people that you lead, that'll help a lot. DC pastors, you've got more of a bird's eye, and this is part of what you are accountable for in helping leaders, is to kind of think through, what are the next things for people. And as I say that, Sam and Isaac, be gracious with me, but I'm accountable to helping them think, "What's this person need next? What are the pitfalls? What are the things that are there?"

Reactive leadership. A couple of observations from Him doing it, real quick: How long
do you think He noticed this? They'd been arguing the whole way. He didn't interrupt
them right away. You know, "bad boy." There, he heard the whole way. How long was
the walk? I don't know. You could look it up if it interests you.

⁸⁴⁰ Do you think it was the first time He'd ever seen it? Probably not. He knew what was in ⁸⁴¹ the heart of men. There are two errors: one is passivity where you see it and don't deal ⁸⁴² with it, the other is to just pick at everything.

Does He disqualify them? Kick them out of his small group, they're not usable, "sorry, 843 you're demoted." Next time there's transfiguration, "sorry, you guys, I'm picking a 844 different combo?" Oddly, it doesn't even make them not be usable. It's kind of helpful for 845 ways that we ourselves are in process, is it not? That God uses messy people. That was 846 actually my Christmas series: "God uses messy people." And I was shocked at how 847 limitless the options were for teaching topics. It could have been a 20-week series. He 848 also, in addressing it, doesn't make them say, "uncle," in the moment. He teaches them 849 what's right and He lets them chew on it. 850

I think earlier on in leading, I was more kind of: bulldog, pin you down, you got to
 confess, repent, whatever it is right here on the spot. That's not always, necessarily, but
 sometimes probably.

there's the work that the Holy Spirit does to do some of the leading.

⁸⁵⁸ Sometimes we feel like it's all on us. And we got to get it all the way from A to B.

⁸⁵⁹ There's work that the Holy Spirit does. Sometimes it's, "Hey, you might consider." "Hey,

can I just explain to you how I might think of that? You can land wherever you land, it

really is okay. But can I kind of just share some thoughts on what I think the Bible might

imply on that? You know, the subjective stuff, that's grey?" And then, you say it, and
 then just let it sit and you see where they land.

⁸⁶⁴ It's remarkable how often people really do land in the right spot.

And if they don't, you got to be okay with it. But he doesn't make him say, "uncle," in the moment. He teaches them what's right and they keep going.

⁸⁶⁷ With proactive leadership, it's speaking into, anticipating the things that are in advance.

There are going to be things where you really, as a leader, just have to believe it's your right and responsibility to speak into.

Some things get dropped into your lap; those are easier. Some things you have to speak
up and say. To equip and to warn. It's true of things possible down the road, you have to
be able to anticipate outcomes.

For me, I think about it like this, "What would this look like played out over time? What's this look like played out over time?"

⁸⁷⁵ Right now, we've got a shocking amount of homeschool folks coming around that are

new. I'll let tony Tony sift through if, for any of you guys, that's kind of a hang-up point.

⁸⁷⁷ We don't have a stake in the ground per se on that, but it is often indicative of a

withdrawing from culture. And the kind of church that God's called us to be, we don't

think is more Puritan-like, it's kind of more Missionary-like, where we really are called to

engage with culture and raise kids that know how to... I mean, you see... who are some

of the most influential people in the Bible in terms of ...?

And, so I've got to think, "Okay, I can either wait until someone says, 'Hey, what do you think about schooling?" Or I can say, "What's this look like played out over time, if I don't find tactful ways to speak into, address? We will end up becoming a church that I don't even want to lead. We'll get kind of stiff and religious-y.

⁸⁹⁰ Pitfalls in people as well: Dating, marriage, those kinds of things.

⁸⁹¹ I mean, shoot, even, my four-year-old, we have to proactively lead him every week

⁸⁹² before soccer at 9:50 because I know his pitfalls. He talks too much. He's a people

⁸⁹³ person, he's used to being around Christians that just love and want to talk. And the other

kids on his team and his coach, don't really care to talk.

⁸⁹⁵ I got to warn him in his emotions because he's an older sibling, and he's very competitive.

And he had a meltdown last week when he wasn't the one that scored the goal. And the

⁸⁹⁷ first time they actually had a three versus three-goal scoring kind of thing. I have to

⁸⁹⁸ proactively lead him every week before soccer on how to not blow a lid emotionally.

We have to proactively lead the people that we lead. For Tytus and Jess — now married in November, Saturday, before a team meeting and 3 DCs, no big deal — I talked with them about, even in the early dating stage, here's where I think your pitfalls are, her pitfalls are, and where they will intersect, and how to navigate it. We don't do formal premarital counseling before they're married, but we talked about that. And you still run right into it anyway, right?

- ⁹⁰⁶ Next steps with people: we got to think what's next, what God's made them to be.

⁹⁰⁷ A story and then we'll wrap up.

There's a guy that just started leading a group a few months ago. He's got a couple of 909 years on me, mid-upper 30s, and he's a Stryker engineer, a really, really, sharp guy. I 910 wonder someday if he might end up on our board or something like that. He just started 911 leading a small group, but it's taken some getting there. He moved from San Francisco 912 area a number of years ago. Kind of one foot in, one foot out for a while, man, am I even 913 really going to make it? Kind of, "Man, okay, I get it. I love the community, the 914 relationships, I feel God's presence," - worship wasn't his thing - but, "like the 915 teaching." He felt like he could relate to me and a couple of our leaders. 916

And so, I can look at it and identify, here's a couple of things that I think this guy's going to... it's kind of what's the all-in-for-Jesus version of this guy look like? Man, if this guy was cleaned up, what's he look like?

- Well, right now he looks like not even want to take a break off from small group around
 Christmas and New Year's and being bummed that we're doing member Bible training for
 the first time because he's all in on Jesus. But that wasn't what it was a year or two ago.
- It was... We had our building offering, the church end up giving half a million dollars for us to get into the building that we now are in. During that, I knew that he was a big investments, really smart with money, Dave Ramsey — and there are some good things about Dave Ramsey, but tithing is an afterthought and sacrificial generosity is not in there at all. And so the kind of inversion there is pretty tipped.

And so during that, I thought, okay, this is an in. And so, I just would say, "Hey, what do you think about some of the stuff we're talking about?" And just, no point in coming in headstrong if the person will go to first base on their own anyway, then you can meet them there and take him to the second. And so, let them do some of the work if they will. Anyway, we got together. Actually, it was at Jungle Joe's, this big inflatable bounce house kind of place in Kalamazoo. You grew up there. [inaudible] Jungle Joe's there back in the day?

Well, we ended up having a series on worship — and you know how I said earlier that kind of power of two to five-minute interactions? We've got two double doors where you

enter our building, and I remember one of the conversations on worship was a two-to-

three-minute conversation, literally right there. As people were walking by, I kind of

Dale? That guy was the bump on the log. Mark's growing, and now he's the bump on the log. And so I'm trying to get Mark, because he's growing, to get the new bump on the log to not be a bump on the log.

I work apprentice-style, shoulder-to-shoulder, I want to focus together, making disciples,
 not just telling about your feelings and your job. And — although I love your feelings
 and your job.

But anyway, I said, "Hey, Hands-on Prayer Clinic is coming up." — Learning to Pray for
Others, whatever we call it. "Why don't you make it your aim to get Dale there? Can you
get him there?" And he ends up not being able to, he's like, "Yeah, he wouldn't respond
to my text," and I'm like, "Yeah, he does that to me all the time, too. It doesn't mean he
hates you."

We're talking about how it's going. So, then I asked, "Are you still going to go to
